To KILL LICE ON CATTLE.—One of our subscribers wishes to know what will kill lice on calves. Whoever has a remedy that he has tried and knows to be successful, let him speak.

A writer in Moore's Rural New Yorker gives this remedy for lice on cattle: "I buy sulphur and saltpeter by the pound, pulverize the saltpeter in a mortar, and during the mild weather in winter give to my stock in proportions of one tablespoonful of sulphur to one teaspoonful of saltpeter, for a full grown animal; about the same for two calves, given with dry feed or meal.

What a California Editor Says.

The Editor of the Sacramento Bee, who is writing a series of letters to this paper from this State, says:

In the matter of manufacturers Oregon is, all things considered, in advance of California, and is less dependent upon foreign workshops.

Flour, woolen goods and lumber are at present the principal products, and the quality of each is of the best. Improved modern machinery is used in most of the mills, and some of these are models of perfection.

R. C. Kinney & Son's flouring mill at Salem, Marion co., is a sample of this class. It is driven by water, and turns out 60,000 barrels of flour annually. Economy of power is here reduced to a science, and the machinery seems to do everything that is done about the establishment with the exception of keeping the books, counting the money and chatting with visitors.

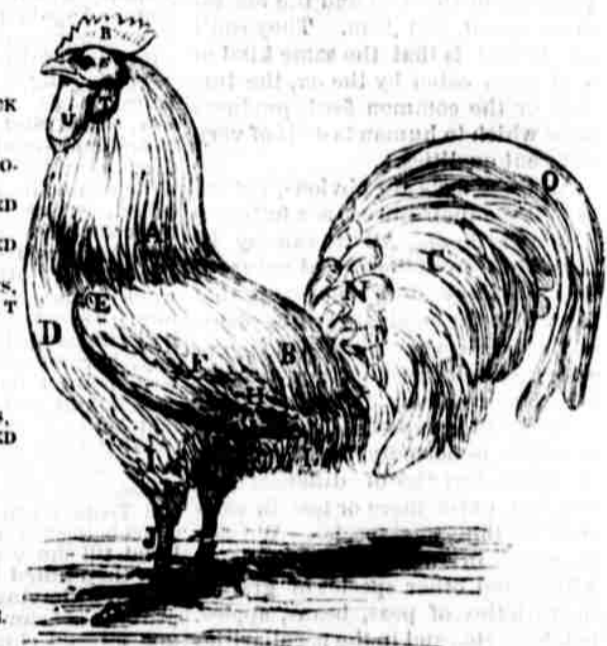
