S B No 18, providing for the travelling and incidental expenses of Justice of the Supreme Court, read second time and referred to a Committee on Judiciary.

S B No 27, authorizing the Supreme Court to appoint one or more Justices, read second time and referred to select Committees—Messrs. Hirsch, Simpson and Grant.

S B No 28, providing for an appropriation to pay the mileage of members of the Legislature, rules suspended, read third time and passed.

H B No 12, relating to Portland, Dulles and Salt Lake railroad, read third time and made special order for Wednesday at 3 o'clock.

H B No 20, referring to soldiers' bounties, &c., being special order for 3 o'clock, was taken up and passed.

Mr. Caples introduced an act encouraging immigration to this State.

Mr. Mason introduced H B No 33, relating to agricultural lands.

Mr. Matlock introduced H B No 36, amending an act to incorporate Oregon City.

Mr. Cranor introduced H B No 37, for an appropriation to erect an insane asylum.

Mr. Clow, H B No 38, relating to maps, plats, &c., of counties.

H B No 50, was introduced to amend laws relating to Supreme Court.

H B No 60, to amend an act relating to billiard tables, &c.

H B No 91, relating to County Judges, House adjourned.

SENATE—MORNING SESSION.

Met at 10 A.M. Prayer offered by L. L. Rowland of Salem. S B No 32, relating to appointment of a Commissioner of Immigration was read second time and referred to the Committee on Federal Relations.

S B No 39, for the financial relief of Coos county, was, on motion considered engrossed, read third time and passed the Senate by a unanimous vote.

S B No 47, for the financial relief of Baker county, passed its third reading and passed the Senate by a unanimous vote.

S B No 43, for construction of a wagon road through Grant and Baker counties, was read third time and passed the Senate by a unanimous vote.

H B No 3, to incorporate the town of Jacksonville, read second time and referred to Committee on Judiciary.

H B No 17, to amend an act regulating ferries, read second time and referred to the Committee on Public Roads.

H B No 22, amending certain State Laws, read second time and referred to the Judiciary Committee.

H B No 34, to incorporate the town of Forest Grove, read second time and referred to a Committee of one, consisting of the Senator from that county.

H B No 56, to incorporate the city of Roseburg. On motion read second and third time and passed the Senate by a unanimous vote.

SENATE—AFTERNOON SESSION.

Senate met at 2 P.M. The hour having arrived for the consideration of House Joint Resolution No 6, relative to the employment of an expert to measure the state printing and compute price thereof, said bill was brought up.

The afternoon was taken up in the debate and several amendments offered but there was only one accepted that being to strike out the word "further" in the last clause of the Resolution. Motions were made to adjourn, substitutes offered in lieu of the preamble, earnest speeches were made against its passage, as well as in favor of the Bill, but it finally passed the Senate by a vote of 18 to 4. Senate adjourned.

PORTLAND MARKET.

The Herald of Sept. 26th says:

Wheat—A considerable quantity of wheat is coming forward by rail for the three vessels now on the berth for Liverpool. A considerable amount of wheat is finding its way to this city daily by wagons from Washington county, where farmers appear to understand the situation better than in other parts of the State. A very considerable quantity of damp grain is being brought to market and sold at a low rate to jobbers, who dry and mix it with prime wheat for immediate conversion into flour. In accordance to late advices, wheat is declining, under the increased rates of tonnage. The best quotations in this market do not range above \$1.40 per cental.

Flour—The market is quite inactive, the principal demand being for home consumption. A few orders from Victoria and Puget Sound are filled by each steamer, at prices favorable to the purchaser. We quote standard brands at \$5.25 per barrel; superfine, \$4.75 per barrel; and country brands from \$4.00 to \$4.50 per barrel.

Oats—The supply is quite large, with quotations at 40c per bushel.

Barley—The receipts are quite light, with a fair demand at 65c per bushel.

Timothy Seed—Several lots have been offered during the week at prices ranging from 50c to 1.00 per bushel. The latter figure is for seed in which no sorrel is perceptible.

Eggs—The supply is somewhat better than for some time past at 30c per doz. for fresh.

Hams and Bacon—The supply is but moderate, with but little demand. Oregon Hams, plain, are quotable at 15c to 16c per lb; Shoulders, 10c to 11c per lb; Side Meats, 14c to 15c per lb.

Lard—Oregon, in tins, 14c to 15c per lb; in bulk, 12c to 14c per lb.

Butter—The supply of fresh Dairy is quite short, while that of medium roll is abundant. We quote choice Dairy at 37c; country do, 25 to 30c per lb.
