The Coming Demand for Animal Food.

CHICAGO, Oct. 25, 1872. ED. FARMER.—There is a growing demand for animal food. The high price of meat in England, led to the late riots. This high price was brought about from the scarcity of animal food, and by a combination of a serious character which is not of a transient nature.

The advancing price is found also in Germany as well as in England and in France. Add to these causes the prosperity of the working people of Continental Europe, and their increasing power to consume animal food, and it becomes evident that the growing demand can hardly be met by any adequate supply.

Our exports are not confined to Great Britain, as in the former years, but we export to the entrepôts of France, Germany and Belgium. Large purchases for future delivery have already been made for Continental Europe.

There is now with us a deficiency of bacon for Southern and foreign trade. It has recently been said that if our excessive stock of barrel pork had been cured as bacon, we should begin the new packing year with empty warehouses.

A recent writer says: "The farmers of the Northwest are looking at their well filled granaries, their immense corn crop, and their teeming pastures, with a feeling, not so much of thankfulness as of despair, where to find a market of remunerative prices."

When we take into consideration the foreign demand for animal food and for grain, the question is easily answered. It becomes no longer a question unsolved. Mr. Mechi, the great scientific farmer, sums up the results of the English harvest in the London Times. He says he is no alarmist, but he believes that England will have to pay for foreign corn, in quantity and price, £15,000,000 to £20,000,000 sterling more than in a good wheat season.

The decrease in the public debt in October was \$5,228,417. The total debt, less cash in the Treasury is \$2,161,795,200.

It seems that the survey for a route for the proposed Darien Canal, to unite the two oceans, is to be resumed. An Eastern Journal gives this: An Inter-Oceanic Canal, connecting the Atlantic and Pacific, is an enterprise of such importance and value to the people of the United States that it very properly commands the support of the Government.
