

The Markets.

Commercial.

There is no change in market rates since last week, except a rise in gold at New York and consequent decline in greenbacks here of 90 to 91.

A large number of vessels continue to arrive at Portland to load with wheat and flour, but we understand that some of them were chartered in the first instance by San Francisco houses that have since failed, so they will have to be rechartered on their arrival at Portland. These vessels do not nearly constitute enough to carry away the Oregon surplus. The question has arisen as to what is the amount of surplus wheat we have to dispose of. Some people in Portland think it may reach 5,000,000 bushels, and the Oregonian is disposed to fix it at 4,000,000 bushels, but we doubt if the country has much over double the surplus this year it did last, and that would give us about 3,000,000 bushels, which we incline to think is about the correct figure. It is a very wild calculation to predict that we shall have as great a surplus next year as California. We shall do remarkably well if we raise one third as much wheat as California, and shall probably fail to accomplish that.

The necessity is evident to induce ships to come direct to the Columbia for our next year's crop, so that Oregon wheat may cut its own figure in the world's markets and not pass for a California product. We raise better wheat than they can in California, and the world will never find it out until we ship it direct, and that can only be done when vessels can be loaded below all the river shoals. This reminds us that we have ascertained that steamboats can take wheat from Salem to Astoria at less than the cost of shipping it by railroad from Salem to Portland. Removal of obstructions in this river will connect Harrisburg with Astoria, and place Oregon on a par with California in shipping wheat.

The most reliable advices from abroad go to prove that Europe will demand all our breadstuffs and that prices must greatly advance before the next harvest. There is also every reason to believe prices must rule high another year, but next fall we shall be apt to hear more about high freights than high prices for wheat, unless we secure a large fleet of ships to take away our crop, for the extra sealing already done gives promise of an enormous yield.
