

EASTERN.

NEW YORK, August 17.—A Paris correspondent says three Carlist officers, responsible for the execution of a German named Schmidt have been arrested.

CHICAGO, August 17.—Lord Dufferin, Governor General of Canada, who has been the city's guest since Saturday, today visited the Board of Trade, accompanied by his wife and staff.

CHARLESTON, August 16.—Jones and Bowley, negro members of the Legislature from Georgetown county are engaged in a dispute which has involved the negroes of that section in a quarrel, and riots are in progress.

LOS ANGELES, August 17.—President Grant, General Babcock and Commodore Emmons left this morning for New York.

NEW YORK, August 17.—The steamer City of Pekin, which went to sea on the 15th on a trial trip, returned this afternoon after an extended and satisfactory test.

NEW YORK, August 18.—Mary E. Pomorozy the alleged victim of Rev. John S. Glendonning, pastor of the Presbyterian Church in Jersey City, died this morning.

CHICAGO, August 17.—Lord Dufferin, during his visit to the Board of Trade today, made a speech in which he said that though it did not become him, as Governor General of Canada and legislator of the Crown, to express his sentiments on political questions, he could not but acknowledge that the Governments of Great Britain and Canada desired to pursue that line of policy that would tend to increase and develop the intercourse existing with the U. S., and make relations with her closer and more satisfactory.

OMAHA, August 17.—A telegram from Fort Fetterman states that a half breed there reports that a council of Cheyennes and Arapahoes had decided to recall their war parties from the vicinity of the railroad and return to the agency.

LITTLE ROCK, August 17.—The Republican State Central Committee have called a State Convention for September 15th.

BOSTON, August 16.—The Republican State Committee today appointed a State Convention to be held at Worcester on the 17th of October.

WASHINGTON, August 17.—Up to date the amount of circulation withdrawn by national banks by deposit of legal tenders is greater than the amount issued since the passage of the new law by about \$1,000,000, thus working a contraction of currency to that extent.

FOREIGN.

OTTAWA, August 16.—Bishop Cheney, of the Reformed Episcopal Church of Chicago, preached to a large congregation this morning and evening.

QUEBEC, August 17.—The Traders' Livery Stables and Driving Sheds, together with a dwelling occupied by the Provincial Secretary, burned last night. Loss, \$40,000.

LOS ANGELES, August 17.—Several artesian wells, recently bored in this valley, are throwing full streams.

WASCOVILLE, Aug. 17.—Geo. Miller, 17 years old, son of Capt. C. E. Miller, of Miller's Landing, near this place, accidentally shot yesterday at 5 P. M., was out hunting with a shot-gun, when one barrel accidentally discharged, the contents lodging in the face, near the eye, inflicting a terrible wound.

ELKO, Aug. 17.—H. House, arrested for killing Smith and O'Brien, two horse thieves, at Cherry creek, on the 27th of June last, was today cleared by the grand Jury—no bill being found against him. The result gives general satisfaction.

GOLD HILL, August 17.—Between 3 and 4 o'clock this morning, an accident occurred in the Haber holding works, killing the engineer, R. D. Day, and seriously injuring Alfred Donald, night boss, by the breaking of the fly-wheel.

ANAHEIM, August 18.—A young man named Louis Arnold, of San Francisco, while visiting Mr. Bittner for the past few days in this city, committed suicide by shooting himself through the head this afternoon.
