

During the trip before last, the Emma Hayward ran into the Willamette Chief, just below Kalama, tearing away the fender to the wheel, and doing other damage. The accident occurred while the two boats were attempting to make a landing at the same time, and but for the skill of the Captain of the Willamette Chief, that boat would have been cut in two at midship.

John Silvey, of Boise, is awaiting trial at Boise City on a charge of selling whisky to Indians.

Business men say times are duller in Salt Lake at the present time than they have ever experienced.

It is estimated that \$20,000,000 have been invested in Colorado mines, by New Yorkers; that the bullion product has been \$3,000,000, and that the property now owned by the companies is worth \$38,500,000. All the figures may be correct, but we deem the last named amount pretty large in proportion to the second.

The following are the appointments for the Idaho district, made at Salt Lake City, last week, by the Rocky Mountain Conference of the M. E. Episcopal Church: J. M. Jamison, Presiding Elder; Boise City, J. A. Van Andra; Idaho City Circuit, D. G. Strong; Fayette Circuit, John Andrewartha and George C. Allender; Rocky Bar Circuit, Silver City and Fort Hall Mission to be supplied.

The *Leader* says that the wool and hide shipments from West Las Animas, Colorado, for two weeks ending August 14th have amounted to 174,000 pounds. A small proportion, probably one-fourth of this was hides, during the same period, 22,110 pounds of wool, and eighteen cars of cattle were shipped; also, by express, \$7,594 worth of gold, and \$14,333.90 worth of silver bullion. The bullion was from the mines of New Mexico.

The building for the Good Samaritan and Orphanage, under the auspices of Bishop Morris, approaches completion, and will probably be ready for use in December.

Rev. Dr. Lindsay, of Portland, has been invited to deliver lectures before the officers and students of San Francisco Seminary, and will probably accept.

Messrs. Williamson & Co., of Albany, received by the Ajax two patent flax breaking machines.

We see by the *Bulletin*, that the bark *Mattie Mackay* has arrived at Portland with a full cargo of sugar and other produce from the Sandwich Islands.

Crowds of visitors are thronging the Oregon Museum, which we take pleasure in certifying is well worth visiting.

C. P. Bacon has purchased Dr. Hawthorne's Hambletonian stallion, said to be for a larger sum than was ever before given for a horse in Oregon.

Along the Sound harvest is pretty well over. The yield of wheat is average, and oats are better than common. The average was larger than last year.

A few weeks ago the directors of the Union Pacific railroad raised the freight on coal from Coalsville to Odgen, a distance of 47 miles, from \$1.36 to \$2.80 per ton, solely with a view to freeze out opposition in coal mining and compel the people of Salt Lake to use the coal taken from the company's own mine.

At a meeting of the Board of Regents of the Territorial University, held at the house of Rev. Daniel Bagley, in Seattle, August 17th, 1874, Rev. George F. Whitworth was elected President of the University. Borah Brown tendered his resignation as President of the Board of Regents, which was accepted, and E. M. Smithers elected to the place.

Quite a number of counterfeit five-dollar pieces are in circulation in Coos county.

Good buffalo robes can be purchased of the Indians in Baker City at from \$10 to \$12.

An unsophisticated grouse flew into Roseburg the other day and got caught for its pains.

A disgraceful fight occurred near Lafayette, last Monday, between two well-to-do farmers.

The gross valuation of property in Lane county is \$1,262, of which \$2,873,867 is taxable. Total number of polls, 1,369.

On last Monday Mr. Dunn, living at North Yamhill, received a serious hurt by getting his hand caught on a meat hook.

On last Thursday morning, Mrs. Ramsdell, of Yacopine, shot and killed a fine large buck, and she didn't scream either.

Lafayette folks dream to strains of music furnished by the hoodlum band on tin horns, devils' fiddles, etc. They can't appreciate it.


The four divisions of Union City will be known as Union, West Union, Dixie and St. Paul Jones. Rather heavy for a small village.
