Condition of the Wheat Market.

At the present time there are a number of vessels at Portland, waiting cargoes, that have been chartered at high prices...

SHREVEPORT, August 31.—It is reported here that the prisoners, including a Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, and two Collectors, captured by citizens at Conshata, on Saturday night, were taken from the escort who were bringing them here, by fifty armed men (supposed to be Texans) and killed.

LOUISVILLE, August 31.—A number of men who went from Stamford to aid in suppressing the troubles in Lancaster, were indicted by the Garrard county grand jury last week, and will appear to-morrow to answer.

NEW YORK, August 31.—The steamship Constitution arrived at Panama August 30th. WASHINGTON, August 31.—The sugar cases in which the Bay City Refinery and Falkner, Bell & Co., of San Francisco, are principally interested, and which were appealed from San Francisco to the Treasury Department at Washington, have been decided in favor of the Government.

MADRID, August 31.—The Carlists made two determined but ineffectual assaults on Pinedera to-day, and engaged at their repulse, set fire to and destroyed houses outside the walls.

ROME, August 31.—Mount Etna has been in a state of eruption since Saturday. Streams of lava are pouring from the crater. Several regiments have been sent to Sicily, because of the increase of brigandage and general lawlessness there.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 1.—At Scholhouse station, about ten miles from the city, on the line of the San Jose Railroad, yesterday, Dominic Ogara and Edw. Knight became involved in a quarrel. Ogara shot his antagonist, who sprang upon him and stabbed him twice, inflicting dangerous wounds, and then fell dead. Ogara was removed to San Mateo county jail.

The Odd Fellows of this city propose to erect a new hall, and a committee of the order will report on the site for the new hall next Saturday.

Complaint is still made by the Sheriff of the overcrowded condition of the county jail, and several new wards are to be constructed at the branch jail.

GREENBACKS UNCHANGED. From Wasco Grange, No. 38.

FIFTEEN MILE, Aug. 15, 1874.

At a meeting of Wasco Grange No. 38, held this day, the following resolutions were passed unanimously: WHEREAS, the people, east of the Cascades mountains, have been greatly burdened, by exorbitant charges for freight and passage, on the Columbia river, for many years past, and capital and emigration driven from this section of country, by the unreasonableness of this great monopoly, the O. S. N. Co., who have held us—with an unrelenting hand, by aiming to change us—all except an humble subsistence.

THEREFORE, Be it resolved by the members of Wasco Grange, No. 38: 1st. That we look upon the action of the Columbia River Transportation Company, in putting on a line of boats, and carrying freight and passengers from Portland to the Dalles, at greatly reduced prices, as a move in the right direction.

2nd. That we will, by words and actions, encourage a healthy competition, and discourage monopoly in transportation on the Columbia river, as also we are resolved to do elsewhere and ever, where our words and actions may reach. 3rd. That we believe it to be our duty to encourage the new company with our patronage, where we can consistently do so, and we recommend and ask others, both in and out of the Grange to do likewise.
