

LATEST NEWS ITEMS.

The health of Hon. Caleb Cushing has greatly improved since he reached Spain. He writes that he has not been as well for twenty years.

A body of 600 longshoremen paraded in New York on the 10th inst., and protested against the extortion of captains, boarding-house keepers and shippers.

At midnight, on Wednesday, John Donohoe, the pedestrian, had walked 273 of the 1,100 miles he is attempting to walk in 1,100 hours, at Nanehester, N. H. He is in good spirits, and hopeful.

It is rumored in Jersey City that the members of that Presbyterian Church, of which Glendinning, the seducer of Miss Pomeroy, was pastor, have resolved upon the dissolution of that church.

About four hundred tailors on a strike paraded the streets of New York last Thursday, bearing flags of all nations. On a wagon was a large box with the inscription, "No more blood money," and calling for the rate of wages they consider their due.

The Colonist states that the contract for building the Penitentiary of New Westminster has been let, and that instructions left Ottawa some days ago for this Province.

Work will be commenced about the 1st prox., and pushed as rapidly as circumstances and weather will allow. Mr. Kirkland, of New Westminster, a most competent and reliable man, has been appointed clerk of the works, which will require about two years and a half to complete, and will give employment to a large number of mechanics.

A gentleman who has resided for some years in Victoria, without "striking" anything worth picking up, received a letter a few weeks ago from Queensland, Australia, informing him that a piece of land owned by him, and left behind as unsalable seven years ago, has suddenly risen to great value in consequence of recent gold discoveries.

The gentleman left in the last steamer with his family for Queensland to take possession of his estate, for which seven years ago, he could not find a purchaser at \$50 but which is probably now worth as many thousand.
