PORTLAND, March 12, 1875.

At a regular meeting of Multnomah Co. Council of Patrons of Husbandry, held in this city to-day, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, Owing to the fact that companles are incorporating in various parts of this State, for speculative purposes, under the name of the Patrons of Husbandry, and soliciting stock from members of the Order, representing that it is to their interest to invest in such companies; and

WHEREAS, Such companies in some cases are composed of individuals not belonging to our Order, and whose interests are in the main opposed to our organization; therefore, Resolved, That we recommend to all good Patrons that they svoid taking stock in such organizations unless approved by the Executive Committee.

Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to the WILLAMETTE PARMER for publication.

WHEAT.

The quotations remain unchanged at Portland, \$1.37% is offered per cental, and wheat is being purchased at that price and sent to San Francisco for reshipment there, as the difference in price fully covers the transportation to that place.

The general news from abroad shows a small advance in the wheat market through Europe but no considerable advance in Liverpool; quotations have touched bottom and can go no lower.

Last year the amount of wheat exported from Oregon was, as Rodgers, Meyer & Co., estimate, 106,000 tons — wheat and flour estimate, 106,000 tons—wheat and flour reduced to wheat—and of this probably 10,000 tons was carried over from the harvest or 1873. Since last harvest the shipments have been only \$1,000 tons, and if more wheat was raised in 1874 than in 1876, as is generally supposed, then there remains in Oregon to-day not less than 25,000 tons of the last year crop. The direct shipments made in the harvest year 1873 4 were 63,000 tons; those of 1874-5 up to this time reach 73,000 tons, which shows a gratifying increase of direct trade.
