GENERAL GRANGE COUNCIL.

Eastern Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

MR. Epiron: The General Council of P. of H. of Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington and Idaho Territory met in the city of Walla Walls, W. T., on the 7th inst., and adjourned after a four days' session.

On account of the Subordinate Granges not having sufficient notice of the meeting, the attendance was not large, nevertheless every thing was harmonious, and, it is thought by the members present, that much good will ensue, and that not only the Patrons but the whole country will be benefitted. The Council adjourned to meet at Weston on the second Monday in October, unless sooner called by the Executive Committee.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year, viz. J. H. Douthit, President; H. T. Levins, Vice President; Wm. M. Shelton, Secretary; John Irvine, Treasurer; M. M. Cushing, Business Agent; Robert Mays, John Irvine and H. T. Levins, Executive Committee.

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted:

Resolved. That it is the opinion of the representatives of the several Granges of Eastern Oregon, Eastern Washington and Idaho Territory in General Council assembled, that the building of locks around the Cascades and the Dalles of the Columbia river by the General Government is the only feasible means for opening up the settlement and profitable cultivation of the vast and beautiful tracts of productive agricultural country lying between the Cascades and Rocky mountains; and the Order is particularly requested to use all honorable means consistent with the organization of the Patrons of Husbandry to procure the proper legislation, and the President and Secretary are requested to furnish the Representative and Senators of Oregon, and the Delegate of Washington Territory, with a copy of this resolution and request their favorable co-operation in the Congress of the United States; and also request the Subordinate Granges to ask their members elect to the Lagislature to mamoriign Congress on the same matter that the State Grange-soon to assemble-to petition Congress on the same subject; and request the Master thereof to bring the subject before the National Grange, and request that body to petition Congress to make an appropriation for the work.

Resolved, That the Secretary furnish the papers of this city, the WILLAMPER FARMER and the Mountaineer with a copy of the foregoing resolution, and request them to publish the same.

California Crops and Markets.

We gather the following from the San

Francisco Commercial Herald of late date: A large surplus of tonnage remains in San Francisco and three or four ships have been obtained for £2 10s per ton, to load for the United Kingdom. Receipts of new wheat have been small

and farmers seem in no hurry to forward their crops.

Reports received at the bureau of agriculture from different sections, show that winter and spring wheat will yield four-fifths of a full crop. Rye promises better than wheat but will fail below the usual average. Oats are in good condition and will reach nearly a full yield in the largest producing States. Barley promises well. Clover is in fair average condition.


