California Crops and Markets.

From the S. F. Commercial Herald of July 1st, we take the following:

We have now completed another harvest year showing a large out-turn of flour and grain, yet the net proceeds are very considerably less than those of the year preceding.

The supply of disengaged tonnage exceeds 60,000 tons—a large fleet of idle ships now lying idle in our harbor.

WHEAT—The receipts of both old and new are quite meagre, and in order to draw out needed supplies of choice old extra quality to meet the necessity of millers, extra ordinary inducements have been made therefor.

Wool—The outgoing Panama steamer carried 53,000 lbs. The Ajax from Oregon brought 708 bales.

WHEAT—The price of California wheat in this country is now so much below its former proportion to other sorts, that notwithstanding the large quantity already received and still expected from California, there seems no reason to expect any greater future relative depression on this sort of wheat than on others.

The very warm weather of the last week is not calculated to assist the late sown spring wheat, but we hear fears expressed that such may be injured thereby.
