THE MARKETS.

Prospects for the Wheat Market.

The most important question new of interest to Oregon producers relates to the prospeets for a good market for our wheat surplus for the coming year. It really seems as if there would be a considerable improvprovement in the demand, based on the following conditions. England will not have nch a group as who had last need a much larger demand from other countries: France has lately been injured by drouths and devastated by floods and ther wheat todds have suffered very greatly there by: Otho: European untiens do not report such an extra good prospect as they mid one year ago: The Atlantic and middle States of America have a serious discinution of yield that reduces the main total targely, perhaps 25 per cent: California will anot have more than half her usual surplus.

These facts are sufficient to igaure a rist in the wheat market at Liverpool, and the question as to a hether that will be immediate or will be defered by the forcing of a

question as to whether that will be immediate or will be defered by the forcing of a great portion of the coming ore, as on the market at an early day has to be first considered. It may be possible that the tise will not reach its maximum before January. Here in Oregon we have premise of a most abundant harvest; we also have assurances that vessels now on the way to California, and the disengaged vessels now in San Francisco, will be abundantly sufficient to freight the whole Catifornia surplus and enough more can be defended upon to satisfy all the wants of Oregon shippers. The Oregonian gives a list of wessels known to be on the way to Portland that have a capacity to carry 20,000 short tons, which added to the surples vessels sure to reach California will relieve us of all fears that tonnage will not be sufficient to meat the demands of Oregon trade. Vessels with a carrying capacity of 8,000 tons are said to be now on the way to Victoria loaded with trou for the Canadian rallway, which may be expected, some of them, to seek Oregon cargoes.

Without going into minute particulars, which would after all be ansatisfactory at this early day, we may consider the prospect for Oregon wheat growers to be good, and it may easily become excellent and insure them a good price, even if not the traditional "dollar a bushel."
