The Minto Pass Mountain Road.

Mountain Musings—Sunday.

Three years ago I made my way up from Salem to near the mouth of the little North Santiam, the object being to find a locality that would afford a good camping place for a family to spend a few weeks in, free from the heat, dust, and hurry of the ordinary valley life, whence from a shady nook a person might have a good view of these grand old mountains and lazily lie and speculate upon what manner of world this was before the mountains heaved their heads above the ordinary level, or whence a blackberry patch or a good trout stream might be reached without too much labor—where, in short, rest might be secured and recreation enjoyed, free from the restraints of the "proprietors."

Well, here I am again, on the same errand, looking from under the shade of a fine maple tree. The first thought is, the absence of company. It is early morning—we call it Sunday morning—and in the stillness and solitude the feeling of peace and rest that steals over the mind here is a reminder of Sunday morning in the city. But, as I lie and watch the sunlight shining upon the mountain side across the narrow valley, the sense of a Presence, of surpassing purity, peace and power, seems to be reflected back to me from that mountain side with greater force than ever came from pulpit orator.

Following up the train of thought awakened by this perception of a Presence, it seems no longer strange that Moses should have ascended the mountain in order to talk with God, and that the Man of Galilee should from the top of an exceeding high mountain had a clear perception of the worthlessness of "all the kingdoms of the earth and the glory of them" as compared with the worship and service of God—or to fancy that the patriarch was influenced by outward surroundings that enabled him at a certain locality to say, "Surely, God is in this place."

But I am rather inclined to rest than write to-day, and will go to the side of the deep pool near by, and, while listening to the soothing music of the running stream, watch the fish seeming to enjoy a perpetual bath, or, wearying of that, walk up the margin of the flashing water and cultivate the faculty which perceives "Sermons in stones, books in running brooks, tongues in trees, and good in everything." But, hark! Ah! I shall not go alone! S. A. Clarke and wife are riding into our camp, and, as he is ready with the pen, I will depend upon him to tell his readers how we pass the rest of this day.
