EASTERN NEWS.

New York Election.

NEW YORK, Nov. 3.—The New York Times estimates the legislature as follows: Senate, 22 Republicans, 10 Democrats; assembly, 80 Republicans, 48 Democrats and claims the election of the entire Republican ticket by 5,000 or 8,000.

Tammany elects 5 of the 10 senators, and 6 of 21 assemblymen.

Total city vote, with the exception of a few election districts in the 21st assembly district, shows the following totals: Bigelow, 73,515; Seward, 43,053; Olney, 48,491; Phelps, 71,021; Smythe, 48,021; Hackett, 71,228.

Two hundred and forty-six election districts give Bigelow 32,758, Seward 21,642, Olney 22,672, Phelps 32,572, Smythe 21,464, Hackett 32,646, and 300 out of 557 election districts show 14,000 majority for Bigelow, 12,200 for Phelps, and 14,000 for Hackett. The whole list of Tammany is beaten.

Massachusetts Election.

BOSTON, Nov. 3.—Complete returns from 322 towns of this State, all but 18, give Rice a majority of 4,833. These figures will be but slightly varied. The Republicans elect all the Counsellors and 31 Senators. The Democrats elect eight Senators, one district doubtful. The Republicans gain heavy on Representatives, but the figures are not yet footed up. Crapo, Republican, is elected to Congress from the 1st district by over 4,600 majority.

Pennsylvania Election.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 3.—The result in the State at this time, 1:30 A. M., is very doubtful. Twenty-two counties, including Philadelphia, heard from, give Hartranft a majority of 1,427. Outside of this city the vote will be very close.

2:10 A. M.—Col. McClure concedes the State to Hartranft by 22,000 majority.

3 A. M.—Forty-seven counties foot up 20,750 majority for Hartranft.

Maryland Election.

BALTIMORE, Nov. 2.—Up to half-past one to-day, the election proceeded in comparatively quiet from what was expected, although bloody fights and knock-downs are frequent and in some wards from one to a dozen shots have been fired, but with no very serious results.

Two hundred and seventeen wards give Carroll for Governor 15,276 majority. The majority for balance of the State ticket about the same. The three remaining wards will probably give a small Democratic majority.

Minnesota.

ST. PAUL, Nov. 2.—Scattering returns indicate the election of the whole Republican State ticket, with the possible exception of Treasurer, by majorities of from 5,000 to 8,000. No returns from the large towns.

New Jersey.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—Returns as far as received from New Jersey indicate that both branches of the Legislature are Republican. Essex county sends one Republican Senator and eight Assemblymen to one Democratic Assemblyman, a Republican gain of five. The Republicans gain two Assemblymen in Hudson and two in Mercer counties. The Republicans have elected Senators in Essex and Union counties, where the Democrats were expected to be successful. They have also elected a Senator in Salem. The Democrats elected Senators in Monmouth and Somerset.

The last dispatches show the Republicans carried 30 members of the House of Assembly, with three Republican counties to hear from, which will swell the number to 36 to 38. The House has 60 members, so that the Republicans have a good working majority.

Wisconsin.

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 2.—Returns from 35 towns and precincts give Taylor, Democratic reform candidate for Governor, 350 majority, a Republican gain of 4,755.

Returns from Milwaukee and 85 towns give Taylor, Democratic reform, for Governor, 72 majority, a Republican gain of 10,017.

Mississippi.

NEW ORLEANS, Nov. 2.—Returns indicate that the Democrats carry Mississippi by 10,000. They have a decided majority in both Houses, and elect two Congressmen, and perhaps all the Congressional delegation.

Kansas.

LEAVENWORTH, Nov. 2.—The whole Republican county ticket is probably elected by about 300 majority. No returns from the State, and nothing can be given to-night.

Virginia.

RICHMOND, Nov. 2.—Meager returns from the State show gains for both Conservatives and Republicans, the former having the largest. In some counties where the Republicans have no candidates, they are supporting the Independents. It is more than probable the general result will not alter the Legislature greatly.

Illinois.

CHICAGO, Nov. 2.—Reports from 40 precincts and nine towns show the following figures for county treasurer: Huck, Republican, 11,947; Hession, opposition, 8,900; Keely, Democrat, 3,709.

The State.

Oregonian returns.
The returns so far received make Lane's plurality 218. Union and Baker counties, from which we have only partial returns, will give additional majorities for Lane, but Curry, Grant and Tillamook are likely to reduce his majority.

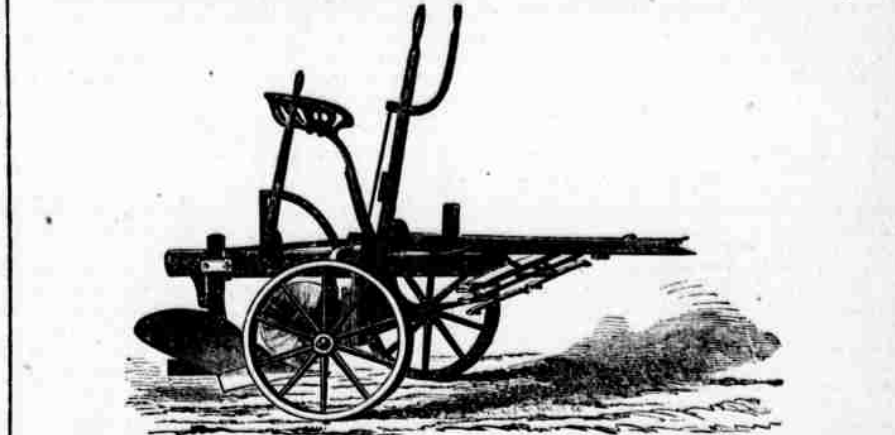
