STOCK THIEVES. — The Walla Walla Watchman says: It is preity well understood, and generally believed among stock men, that band of well organized thieves have their head-quarters located at some point on the Columbia above the mouth of the Snake river. There is a wrowing uneasiness among stock men in that quarier, and they have but little assurance that they will ever find cattle or horses that have strayed away for any length of time. This band we understand are believed to extend their operations as far down as the Hudson Bay farm on the Walla Walla. A few head of horses and cattle are occasionally missing, and are not apt to turn up again. This is happening at various points at brief intervals. These men have been seen swimming small bands of cattle and horses across the Columbia where the probabilities of the owners finding them is more remove, while the deaper to the the probabilities of the owners finding them is more remote, while the danger to the thieves is less, and the chances for working off are more numerous. Many of the cattle it is thought, are slaughtered for sale to the Indians, and Chinamen working in the unines on the Columbia river. To avoid de-tection the hides are either sunk in the river or effectually put out of sight by some other means. #### Fatal Accident.

Friday evening, at the farm of Mr. John Stanton, living near Sublimity, in this county, there occurred one of those terrible accidents so often resulting in death, from the effects of what is known as damp in wells, it seems that Mr. Stanton is digging a new well which is now down 42 feet, the lower portion being blasted out of the solid rock. The workmen had not been in it for several hours, and a couple of neighboring boys coming alone, one of them, Wm. Lewis, aged about 14 years, expressed a desire to enter the well. Mr. Stanton lowered him down by means of a bucket and rope attached to a windlass. Soon after arriving at the bottom he exclaimed, "I am getting sleepy, draw me up." This Mr. Stanton attempted to do, but the unfortunate young wan soon seemed to lose consciousness and losing his hold on the rope fell out of the bucket into the bottom of the well again. His companion and half brother, a son of Thos. Burnett, a lad some ten or tweive years old, seeing the condition he was in, bravely requested to be lowered to his assistance. This was done, and in the hurry and excitement it was neglected to the him fast to the bucket. He succeeded in getting hold of his brother and was being drawn up again, but the subtle gasses soon overpowered him, his hold relaxed and despite his will, the doomed brother again feil to the bottom. Those at the windlass raised him to the top as soon as possible, and none too soon, for just as he reached the top he, too, lost consciousness and lot go of the rope and would have failen back and shared the fate of the other, had not Mr. Stanton, observing his danger, caught hold of him and thus saved him. All hope was now abandoned of rescuing young Lewis alive. Grappting hooks were obtained and after some two hours and a half his now lifeless lody was brought to the surface. 
