

Letter from Coos County.

COQUILLE CITY, March 12, 1877.
ED. FARMER: We are having considerable rain this month, and the river is correspondingly high. Weather mild, average range of mercury in the early mornings, 48.

There is a man living on Coos river, in this county, who is making a "good thing," with a fruit-dryer. The same can be done here by numbers of men, by application of the requisite amount of brains, muscle, and a little money to begin with. This section can discount the Willamette valley as a fruit-raising country, yet this industry remains to be developed here. And yet, in this valley, teeming with natural fertility, there is not, at the present time, a pound of butter or cheese, a bushel of onions, a dozen of cabbages, or a handful of dried fruit of any kind, to be got for love or money, except it be brought from California, where the expense of production and shipment is twice what it would cost to produce the same article here. Our breadstuffs nearly all come from San Francisco, and the merchant, logger, and miner draw their supplies from that mart, and we are practically part and parcel of that State. Yet the cry on every tongue (with a few exceptions) is "hard times," "no market." Many people are "hard up," and their places for sale, and we look longingly for the enterprising immigrant who shall come in and change all this. While people are rushing by hundreds and thousands into the Willamette valley and Eastern and Southern Oregon, let them not forget to look after the inducements offered by the coast counties in general, and Coos county in particular.
