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The Indian War. (From the Lewiston Teller.)

At the War Department, Washington: A disastrous Indian war has begun. There is no Territorial law creating militia, and only 20 regulars here.

On yesterday morning General M. V. Brown commanding the Second Brigade of O. S. M., sent the following dispatch to the Governor:

General Brown: DEAR SIR:—Your patriotic offer of the organized militia of the State for the campaign against the Indians east of the mountains fully received.

ARRIVAL OF GENERAL BROWN. The General arrived from Albany by the Express this morning, and after an interview with the Governor, immediately gave orders to Capt. J. B. Lister to recruit Company E (Capital Guards) to their maximum standard.

General Brown: DEAR SIR:—Your patriotic offer of the organized militia of the State for the campaign against the Indians east of the mountains fully received.

OFF FOR PORTLAND. General Brown left on the afternoon train for Portland, carrying the following letter of instructions.

GOVERNOR CHADWICK: Great alarm felt here for the citizens of the Wallowa. We have guns but no ammunition. Please forward with utmost dispatch 5,000 rounds for U. S. muskets and 5,000 for needle guns.

GOVERNOR CHADWICK: In answer 3,000 cartridges were forwarded by express this P. M. all that were ready.

GOVERNOR CHADWICK: The Governor has received a telegram stating that orders would have to come from Washington to deliver U. S. arms and ammunition to citizens.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 21. Hon. John H. Mitchell, U. S. Senator, Washington, D. C.: Ask Secretary of War to instruct Commander of Department of Columbia to supply citizens of Oregon in vicinity of Indian hostilities, with arms and ammunition from Vancouver on requisition of the Governor.

S. F. CHADWICK, Governor. (Signed) Watkins, Inspector; Monteith, Indian Agent. Gen. Howard having telegraphed Gen. Sherman that disaffected Indians to the number of 1,500 in all, and other facts and particulars which have in substance come from San Francisco, in press telegrams, Gen. Sherman sent a telegram to Gen. McDowell as follows:

FROM GENERAL BROWN. General Brown, who is in Portland, telegraphs this A. M., as follows: PORTLAND, June 22.

Gov. S. F. Chadwick: Plenty of ammunition and arms at Vancouver but can't get them without your requisition on the Secretary of War. Please ask him for an order on General Howard for 10,000 rounds of metallic cartridges. Major Wood will transfer on receipt of order. MART V. BROWN.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 22. A dispatch from Major General W. H. Eflinger of Portland, received by the Governor this A. M., states that he is awaiting orders.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 22. I have seen your dispatch to Senator Mitchell and have sent the following dispatch to Gen. McDowell, San Francisco.

WESTON, June 22, 1877. To Gov. Chadwick, Salem, Ogn: I have seen your dispatch to Senator Mitchell and have sent the following dispatch to Gen. McDowell, San Francisco.

SALEM, June 22, 1877. Can you send one hundred stand of arms to Weston? CHAS. McMORRIS. THE GOVERNOR'S ANSWER.

SALEM, June 22, 1877. I have made a requisition for guns and ammunition under your request, of Department Commander at Portland, Gen. O. O. Howard.

General Brown has directed the Capital Guards to be filled up at once, and hold themselves ready for marching orders.

THE GUARDS WILL MEET TO-NIGHT for drill and to receive volunteers. Gen. Howard telegraphs Portland this A. M. that the Indians have all crossed Snake River and seem to be pushing to the South East.

As per announcement in the DAILY RECORD of yesterday, and in small posters circulated on the street, the Capital Guards met last night at their armory for the purpose of filling up the ranks of the company to the maximum standard, so as to be in readiness to respond to the call of the Governor should they be needed to aid in protecting the frontier settlements of the State from the threatened attack of the Indians now on the war path in Idaho near the Oregon and Washington Territory lines.

The following answer was received to the foregoing: CORVALLIS, JUNE 21. General M. V. Brown, Salem: Have turned over to the county, guns at the College. Can be forwarded to you upon order of County Judge. He can't be found. Will see him this evening. D. CARLISLE.

General Brown left on the afternoon train for Portland, carrying the following letter of instructions.

SIR:—You will please ask Gen. O. O. Howard commanding Department of Columbia, if in his power to furnish the State of Oregon with such arms and ammunition as you may deem necessary for the protection of the settlers on our exposed frontier, and advise with me.
