Resolutions.

The following resolutions passed at the last State Grange express the feelings of people in regard to their rights, which ought to be respected if companies expect their patronage:

Whereas, the Supreme Court of the United States has in exhaustive decision affirmed the right of the people in legislative enactments, to define the limits of corporate rights and exactions, placing them within the purview of legislative bodies; therefore, be it,

Resolved, That this convocation hereby extend its thanks and gratitude to the members of the last Oregon Legislature who valiantly fought the fight for the people against the Locks Monopoly, and who by legislation placed the status of that corporation squarely within the bounds of law.

Whereas, we hear that the said Locks Company, notwithstanding the mandates of the court and the law in regard to the matter, is resisting plain requirements, by not furnishing the Canal Commissioners with lists of freight, as therein required; therefore,

Resolved, That we call upon the said Canal Commissioners to vigorously assert the rights of the people and compel a strict observance of said law, believing its enforcement the only safeguard for reasonable freights in the Willamette Valley, until the people through the next Legislature can more forcibly, and generally assert their prerogative.

Resolved, That we recommend a hearty support of the Companies that have placed boats on the Willamette river, thereby reducing freights to a reasonable standard.

At a regular meeting of McMinnville Grange, No. 31, P. of H., June 16, 1877, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, the W. T. & L. Co., while enjoying a monopoly of the carrying trade on the Willamette and Yamhill rivers, exacted from the people exorbitant rates of freight; and, whereas, the P. F. C. Co., in placing upon those rivers the steamers, have caused the reduction of freight to fair living prices; and, whereas, if the McMinnville is not sustained, she will suffer the fate of other boats which have dared to compete against the "old line," and leave us again at the mercy of a soulless monopoly; and, whereas, our merchants, druggists, shoemakers, blacksmiths, and others who seek our patronage, lay upon their patrons the burden of transportation; and, whereas, all persons who give their freight to the "old line," while the McMinnville is able and willing to serve them as well for a reasonable compensation, are opposed to the best interests of the farming community and to the general prosperity of the country; therefore,

Resolved, That, other things being equal, we will withhold from such persons our patronage, and give it to those who patronize our interests.

Resolved, That we will not support by our patronage any paper which we have good reason to believe is not in sympathy with the independent lines and opposed to oppressive monopolies.

Notes from Spring Valley Grange.

Sister Hunt and myself met by invitation with Spring Valley Grange, on Saturday last. This Grange meets at Zena, Polk Co., in one of the best portions of Polk, and for orcharding the country is not surpassed by portion of our State.

On the farm of Bro. Teller, I saw many fine old plum trees twenty-five years old, in perfect health, and he has a large orchard of peaches and peach plums. The peach plum, I am sorry to say, seems to be short lived. While many of Bro. Teller's peach plums were apparently healthy, a large number bore signs of speedy decay, and his trees were as yet only from three to four years old, and he has a fine situation for the plum. The peach plum pays for setting, nevertheless, as it bears heavily while living, many of the trees bearing the second year after planting.

We stopped over night with Bro. Teller, and the next day he led the way to the Grange hall, where we found a good turnout. Bro. Gibson, Master of this Grange, is a very efficient Master. Bro. White is an able Overseer. Bro. Pierce is Secretary, and his report was a model one. Miss L. J. Walker is Ceres, Miss Sarah Gibson, Pomona, and Mrs. Teller is Flora. It is pleasant to see a Grange as well officered as is Spring Valley, and so well ordered. Among the visitors we noticed Bro. and Sister Clark. Bro.
