

Dr. M. S. Sassareth.

We have been permitted to make the following extract from a letter sent Mr. Byars, of the Roseburg Platdealer, by Dr. J. FISH PROPAGATION.—The directors of the Oregon and Washington Fish Propagating Company met at the Occident in Astoria on Thursday evening. Prof. Livingston Stone was present and made a report. The site selected is the Umatilla river. A levy of 25 per cent. of the subscribed stock, was made payable to the treasurer, for the purpose of beginning the work at once. We understand that Mr. Livingston Stone, the United States Fish Commissioner, does not entirely give up the taking of salmon on the Upper Columbia, but will endeavor to secure some at the Umatilla. Not having been successful so far up there, he has deemed it best to take some at Cathlamet bay to be sure of at least two million young fishes from the spawn.—Oregonian

CHRISTIAN COLLEGE.—The Messenger says: The commencement exercises of Christian College took place Wednesday afternoon commencing at 1.30 and lasting till five. The essays and orations were all excellent and gave great credit to the graduating class. The degrees were conferred by Dr. L. L. Rowland, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, with a few very appropriate remarks. The Baccalaureate address was then delivered by Pres. T. F. Campbell, which was replete with wisdom and advice to those about to leave their alma mater.

Walter A. Wood's Harvester and Self-Binders.

From the Wisconsin State Journal, published at Madison, Wis., we take the following:

GRAND SALE OF HARVESTING MACHINES.—Probably the greatest sale of harvesting machines ever made in the United States, at one time, for any one firm, has just been made by FULLER, JOHNSON & Co., of this city. OLIVER DALRYMPLE, of St. Paul, who has 8,000 acres in wheat, in the Red River valley, has bought from FULLER, JOHNSON & Co. thirty one WALTER A. WOOD'S Self-Binding Harvesters. DALRYMPLE had ten of these machines last year, with which he harvested the 1,300 acres, and he then had in grain, so that he knows just what he is about. The forty one machines are expected to harvest the 8,000 acres, and do it up in good season, being about 200 acres to each machine.

We understand that Mr. Wood has just filled a cash order for Binders to go to Australia and New Zealand, amounting to about \$100,000 in gold. This order resulted from a few binders sent out on trail for last harvest.

The annual meeting of the Lincoln Warehouse and Shipping Company took place last Saturday, June 29, and elected Ira B. Townsend, J. H. Hawley, and T. Pearce, directors for the ensuing year. A dividend of 40 per cent. was declared and paid upon the capital stock, and that upon a storage at 2 1/2 cents per bushel. T. PEARCE.

Wheat and Wool.

The Salem Mills offer on'y one dollar per bushel for wheat and wheat quotations from Liverpool show a weak market.

Wool continues to improve steadily at Eastern markets, Salem buyers offer 20c as highest figure while Douglas county quotations are 20 1/2 to 30 cents, as we explain elsewhere.

Boston, June 30.—Wool in active demand; sales of the week, 2,750,000 pounds; all available lots continue to be taken at full and generally advancing prices. Now fleeces are arriving freely, but there is not much of any assortment offering. Some 6,000,000 pounds new sold during the week at prices ranging from 42 1/2 to 48c. Quotations for the most part are nominal; XX could not be purchased under 50c; 52 1/2c, No. 1 and X, 45 1/2 to 47c; Michigan and Wisconsin ranged from 43 to 45c; combing and delaine in good demand; sales of 140,000 pounds at 50c; 55c, mostly 52 1/2c. Texas in demand; sales of 773,000 pounds at 39 1/2 to 41c; pulled, firm and sold up close, sales 319,000 pounds at 35-50c, latter for very choice super; bulk of sales in range of 40 to 45c California spring in demand; sales 1,041,000 pounds at 21-37c; principally at 30c; market firm for all desirable lots. Sales of fall, 90,000 pounds at 19-21c.
