#### THE WHEAT MARKET.

The harvest through the State is fully half gathered, and while the re sults are disappointing in some instances,still the average yield is satisfactory and the surplus we will have to dispose of is in excess of all former years.

There was an undoubted scarcity of bread stnffs in Europe up to the commencement of harvest, but that no longer exists, and whether or not the any other patentee. If he has, the proper production in European countries shall fall below the average there will still be at the close of harvest an immense amount of breadstuffs on hand over and above all immediate demands with an immense crop in the United States, said to exceed that of any former year, to draw upon to supply any deficiency that may appear to exist later in the season.

The war in Europe is localized with no present indications that other nations will be drawn into the struggle. Turkey is not a wheat producing country to any great extent and has little or no wheat to export. Russia will probably have her usual harvest and if the men are off to the wars, the women who are used to field work will save the g a n that is ready to harvest. The pres n war will not materially affect the grain supply, though its influence may be more felt another year. We have, ben, little to really depend apon to sustain prices more than the known fact that the world's granaries were cleanly swept to supply the wants of the nations up to the harvest time, and If the yield sha'l prove average, as a general thing, there will be no great fear of scarcity, while that fear will in any case be removed as far into the future as next Spring.

The bread crop of the world amounts to such an immense quantity that no speculation can wield it or control it, until the stocks in hand are greatly diminished, which will not be before late in the winter at best. So that our conclusion is that the foreign market which is already weakening, may grow weaker through the fa'l and our local market be influenced thereby, unless we shall have local causes to make an active demand. We have this in our favor: That there will be plenty of tonnage to carry off all the wheat raised here and in California, and that insures a prospect of at least reasonable and perhaps low freights. The oppositio i steamship line gives us cheap freights to San Francisco and much wheat will be sent there for reshipment to Europe. Freights are already reasonably low and will continue so in all probability. Any dectine in the European market will be felt here, TO SCHOOL D:R CCTORS AND OTHERS. however, more or less.

Our readers must weigh all these facts to decide if they will sell soon to realize a fair price, or hold on to try for a better one. If a man is forehanded and can afford to take the chances, he is all right whether wheat rises or falls, but the most of farmers cannot do that, and it is more than likely that wheat will drop gradually lower between now and the first of January. We have constantly held the matter up in this light for a month past and we now feel inclined to take a more positive position with regard to the wheat market and urge the points we have here mids to snow that unless the producer can well afford to take the chances and stand any possible loss his sa est course is to realize at present prices and make sure of a good thing, on the common sense principle that 'a bird to the naud is worth two in the bush."


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
