Should you be a despondent he takes out his glass and sees at a glance sufferer from any of the effects of Dyspensia, the structure of the article in hand, and knows more about it than he who toiled a year in its production. The same is true of seeds. The magnifier is applied to park to see if it is inf-sted with trichina. I think it is true, as a rule, that the buyers of farm products know more about them than the producers. The man who knows the most always gets the best of the bargain. It is certain that knowledge is power in making a trade. It can safely be set down as a rule that a man who, from natural or artificial reasons, can see a hundred times as much as his neighbor, will know the markets."




