WALDO HILLS, Nov. 10, 1877. One would suppose that enough rain had fallen here since August 25th to make the ground too wet for plowing, in swall and low, flat lands. But such is not the case. P., Malculm McCormick and Elizateth Sims, all of Marion county, Oregon. grain was spoiled in the fields on account of the very wet weather since August. But men that braved the toils, dangers, losses and hardships of crossing the plains, mountains, sage brush, deserts and canyons, and made homes here, far far away from home, do not incline to set down here and bemoan their sad fate because of losing some grain.

But they are turning up the rich soil here and preparing to double their crops, if possible, next harvest. Two grand objects now before them is, to sow largely of wheat this Fall, drain well and plow deeply. The Monitor and Champion seed sowers, drills and cultivators, should now come into general

The next object is to see that there are enough harvesters and self binders bought and on band before next harvest. If the headers can all be laid aside or burned, and a full supply of our Pacific Threshers had or some others as good, if such can be found, there will be little danger of loosing grain by the little danger of loosing grain by and saved, will pay for the land upon which it is raised. Tilling the soil here is a safe and sure business, if well and properly rain next harvest. Hence the great need of general and extensive sowing this Fall. And where lands cannot be sown this Fall to grain, it is to be hoped that they will be plowed deeply, well drained, and made ready for an early crop next Spring.

One word about hay: Having wheat on the brain, our farmers have plowed up nearly all their meadows for wheat, and there is a great scarcity of hay. Let thousands of acres of our swall lands and white lands be seeded down to timothy this Fall, and fair crops of hay can be taken from them next VERITAS.

It is a fact, that Oregon is one of the very best fruit countries in the world. In no country do fruit trees grow so rapidly, bear so early and so regularly, so abundantly; and bear truit so large and so delicious, as in Oregon. Our standard fruits are applies, pears, plums cherries, currants, gooseberries, peaches and grapes. Our fruit trees are larger at three years old from the graft, than they are at seven years old in the Atlantic States, or in the Western or Northern States.

It is a fact, that lands are cheaper in Oregon, all things considered, than in any part of the United States. This is owing to the fact that we have too much land for the

It is a fact, that Oregon is a superior country for flax culture and for hops. Each acre of land properly sown to flax may be safely estimated at twenty bushels of good seed, which commands a ready home market at one dollar and a baif per bushel, and the lint stalks worth ten dollars per ton. Factories for linseed oil, for material for upholstering and for the stalks worth ten dollars per ton. ing, and for twine, are already erected in this valley. The culture of hops proves very profitable to our producers.

It is a fact, that we have the most extensive forests of the best timber in the world. The variety is not as great as in some countries. The forests are composed of cedar, fir, hem-lock, spruce, balm, oak, asb, maple, aider, and monster laurel. The diameter and alti-tude of our forest and mountain timber is almost past belief by foreigners. It is no uncommon thing to find cedar, fir, pine and spruce, measuring from twenty-four to thirty-six feet in circumference, and from 150 to 300 feet high. The quantity of lumber, rails, shingles or cord wood per acre, on such lands is incredible. And we have millions of acres of such timber lands. Hence these lands are of immense present and prospec-

lands are of immense present and prospective value to our State.

We never have a failure of crops, nor scorching drouths. Our stock is but seldom fed in Winter, and snow seldom lies on the ground but a few days at a time.
