Resumption Arrangements. New York, Nov. 12.—The clearing house to-day decided upon the following plan of action after January 1, 1879.

The Indiana Pivots. CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—The Inter-Ocean has a special giving a conversation with the pivot in Indiana politics, De La Matry, who says he will certainly vote with the Democrats in the event the house ties on the election of president, provided always, that the Democratic candidate is a soft money man.

Fraud and Neglect. JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Nov. 12.—Judge Wetherspoon, of the canvassing board of Madison county, was arrested last night by a deputy U. S. marshal on a charge of receiving and destroying one of the precinct returns which gave Bisbee 57 majority. He is held in \$3,000 bail.

Tammany Officials to be Investigated. NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—A dispatch from Albany says: Governor Robinson will follow up the defeat at the polls in this city on Tuesday last by positive action against every Tammany official whom he has legal power to investigate.

The Missouri Legislature. St. Louis, Nov. 12.—About 100 counties in this state give the following result: Senate—Democrats, 15; Republicans, 1; Greenbackers, 2. House—Democrats, 97; Republicans, 14; Greenbackers and Independents, 19.

A Butler Nomination. BOSTON, Nov. 12.—The Butler faction of the Democratic party has nominated Frederick O. Prince for mayor.

Looks Like Fraud. A special to the Sun and Press from Alachua county says the canvassing board to-day threw out three precincts, one because the name of a candidate is wrong on the tickets, and two because duplicate precinct returns did not agree. This action, if sustained, reduces Bisbee's (Rep.) majority in the county from 550 to 97, and elects Hull, Dem. It also elects a Democrat to the legislature in the place of L. G. Dennis. A deputy marshal arrested the canvassing board this evening, and they are to be taken before the U. S. commissioners tomorrow. A petition is being circulated in Jacksonville by Republicans, asking the supreme court to convene in special session for the purpose of obtaining a mandamus to compel a recount.

The Grand Army. PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 12.—The twelfth anniversary of the organization of the Grand Army of the Republic was celebrated to-day by a street parade, a review by Gov. Hart-raft, addresses by prominent members, and a grand concert.

Magninus Re-Elected. HELENA, Mont., Nov. 12.—Magninus, Dem., present delegate, is re-elected by a large majority over the Independent candidate. The Republicans had no candidate.

The Committee on Indians. OMAHA, Nov. 12.—The joint congressional committee to investigate the transfer of the Indian bureau to the war department having returned from the Pacific coast, adjourned here to-day to meet in Washington on the 25th inst. They will submit their report to congress in January.

American Yuz Seized by Canadian Officials. DELAWARE, Nov. 12.—It is rumored here that an American tug was seized at Salt by the Dominion officials for working in Canadian waters. The tug was trying to get off the steamer Quebec, aground for some days in the Magnetic shoals.

The Fishery Question. NEW YORK, Nov. 12.—The Times Washington special says that Salisbury's reply to Everts on the fishery question was received there by cable yesterday. Contents unknown. It is believed in diplomatic circles that the award will be promptly paid.

Salisbury and the Fishery Award. WASHINGTON, Nov. 12.—It is said here that Lord Salisbury in his reply to Secretary Everts is as earnest in his position that the Canadian fishery award was made in accordance with the treaty of Washington as Everts is in maintaining the opposite view. The correspondence is not likely to be concluded by the 23d, when the award is due and it will probably be paid under protest.

A Change of Policy. CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—The Tribune's Washington special says: Ex-Senator Chandler had a friendly interview with the President to-day, and insisted on a thorough organization for the campaign of 1880. He believed the Republican party stronger than ever. Recent elections have convinced the administration of the general inefficiency of federal officers of the south.

Disappointed Democrats. WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—A special says the Democrats are terribly disappointed, as they were confident that the average result would show some gains in their favor. Their congressional losses in New Hampshire, Connecticut and New York caused them to be disappointed, and for a time they were not certain whether their party would be able to maintain a solid front in the house of representatives. The Republicans are fully satisfied with the result, as the gains made are greater than were expected, and more than compensate for the losses sustained in October. Had the Republicans of the south been given a fair and full opportunity to cast their ballots, there can be little doubt that a sufficient number of Republicans would have been honestly chosen to congress from that section to change the political complexion of the lower house and give them a working majority in the forty-sixth congress. The domination of the Democrats in the lower branch of congress is attributed to the disfranchisement of Republicans in southern states by the peculiar methods of violence and lawlessness adopted by Democrats to make that section solid for their party.

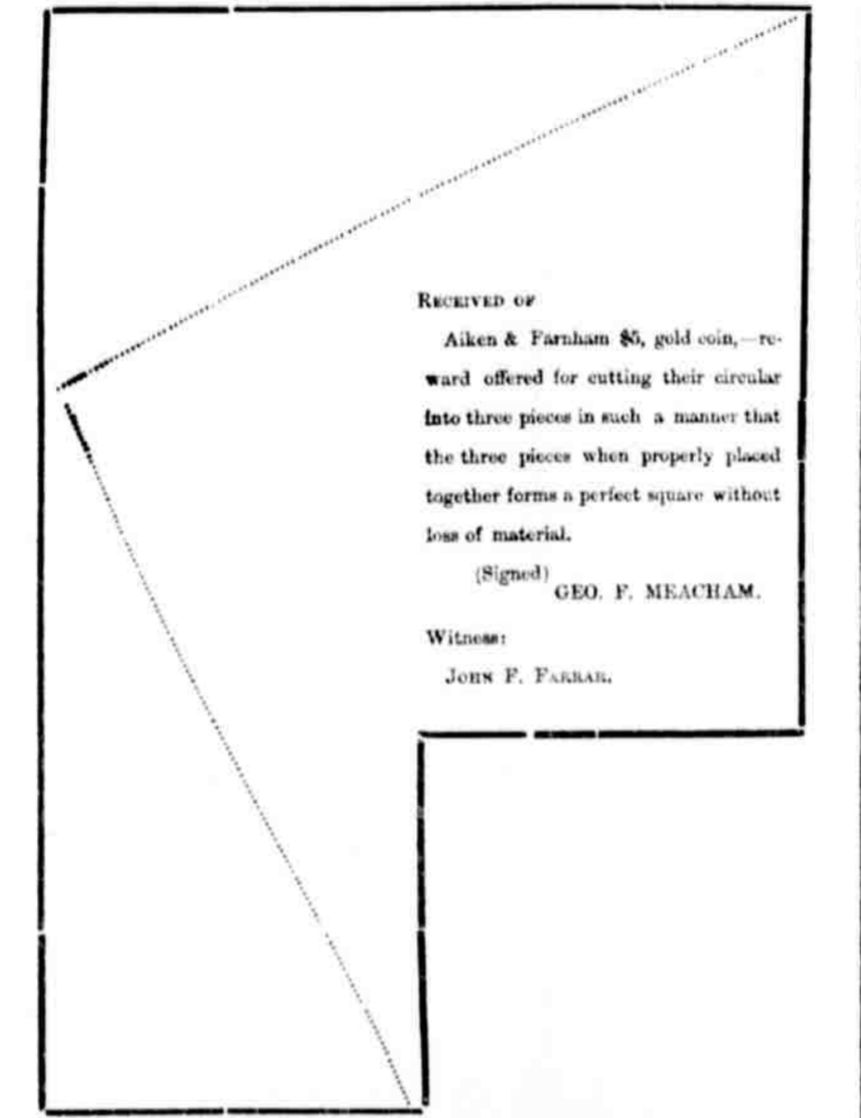

Gov. Virginia Preparing out. A Virginia City dispatch says that during Sunday and Monday 200 miners were discharged from the Con Virginia mine, of which 185 had been employed on the 17th, 18th, and 19th of the month.
