Canadian Immigration.

It is a significant fact that during the year ending June 30, 1878, no less than 80,610 Canadian immigrants to the United States passed through Port Sarin. DIPTHERIA.—As this disease sometimes appears in the spring, we copy the following from the New York Tribune: We have just received a receipt for the cure of diphtheria from a physician, who says that, out of one thousand nine hundred cases in which it had been used, not a single patient had been lost. The treatment consists in thoroughly swabbing the back of the mouth and throat with a wash made thus: Of table salt, two drachms; black pepper, golden seal, nitrate of potash, alum, one drachm each. Mix and pulverize, put into a teacup half full of water, stir well and then fill up with good vinegar. Use every half hour, one, two and four hours, as recovery progresses. The patient may swallow a little of the mixture each time. Apply one ounce each of spirits of turpentine, sweet oil and aqua ammonia, mixed, every hour to the whole of the throat, and to the throat bone every four hours, keeping flannel on the part.

The Olympia Courier says: An exchange reports that Harry Sutton, who escaped from the Port Townsend jail while under five years' sentence for killing a man, is now in an interior Mexican town. It is to be hoped he will stay there. He was a desperado of more than ordinary intelligence as well as blood-thirstiness. His mother was wealthy and spent many thousand dollars in trying to get him to lead an honest, useful life. In 1871 she gave him \$10,000, at one time, with which to buy printing presses and material. He spent about \$5,000 of it for that purpose and nearly all the rest in drink, debauchery and crime. The material he purchased was brought to Port Townsend, where it was purchased by the Courier Publishing Company and brought to Olympia.
