FLAX CULTURE.

504 BATTERY STREET, SAN FILANCISCO, Cal.

Editor Willamette Farmer:

I am requested by the Oregon Emigration Agent here, Mr. Shepherd, to write you an article on flax culture for the information of the armers of your district.

1st. Plow the land well when dry and no langer of frost. Harrow and roll, then sow good, clean seed, from 100 to 120 pounds to the statute acre. Harrow both length and crosswise with a seed harrow; then roll again. If rain falls after the seed is sown, so much the better; it causes the seed to all sprout at once, and the flax, when ready for pulling, is of uniform length.

If these instructions are properly attended to the flax, when matured (I mean the straw), should be from three to five feet long if sown on suitable land.

I am now prepared to buy, and will be for the next twelve months, any quantity of flax, ... when harvested three feet or more long. and free of branches. Branched flax is useles grown in California, but I am marry to say it is seless, being only from twelve to twerty-loss inches long, and hadly branched.
