The American Flag

The lilstory, or rather the origin of

the regulars made the great mistake of supposing that it was a token of supmission to the king, whose speech had London in 1846 a perfect avalanche of just been sent to the Americans. The British Register of 1776 says, "they (the rebels) burnt the king's speech and just now discovered that 392 of these changed their colors from a plain red plays are "out and out" plagiarisms, ground to a flag with thirteen stripes, as a symbol of the number and union of the colonies." A letter from Boston, published in the Pennsylvania Gazette, in 1776, says, "the Union flag was raised on the 2d, a compliment to the United Colonies."

These various flags, the Pine-Tree, the Rattlesnake and the Stripes were used are founded upon an English according to the tastes of the patriots monk's rendition of the French monk's until July, 1777, when the blue union of the stars was added for each new State. but the fiag became too large and Congress reduced the stripes to the original thirteen, and now the stars are made to correspond in number with the States. No one who lives under the protection of the Stars and Stripes will deny that "the American flag is the most beautiful that floats upon any land or sea." Its proportions are perfect when it is properly made-one-half as broad as it is long. The first stripe at the top is red, the next white, and these colors alternate, making the last stripe red. The blue field for the stars is the width and square of the first seven strings, viz., foor red and three white. The colors of the American flag are in beautiful relief, and it is altogether a splendid national emblem. Long may it wave untarnished!
