## Commercial.

THURSDAY MORNING, April 10, 1879. From the Commercial Herald we learn that trade was dull in San Francisco April 3, which is attributed to the distrust pervading business circles at the probability of the adoption of the new constitution, but it is equally possible that the duliness is natural to a spring following a season of low prices and not very productive crops. The same may be said of Portland, and the duliness is no doubt due to the absence of coin in the country, for it is evident that money is scarce in all trade circles, as well as in farmers' pock-

San Francisco quotations show that oats continue to rule low, potatoes are plentiful and cheap, onions scarce and high, hav and feed low. Wool of the spring clip was coming in freely, but prices not fully established. Hides and tallow were low, and the same is

said of all other products. The wheat market remains without change Liverpool advices are the same as last week, or almost identical, and prices here show no variation. There is no wheat moving on the railroad or down the rivers, or none to constitute a business of importance. Two iron vessels have completed their cargoes of flour for the United Kingdom, and the Valley Forge will be loaded with wheat this week, but no one knows where the next cargo will

ome from. Up country warehouses are cleaned out, and what wheat comes from the upper Columbia goes to San Francisco to pay for agricultural machinery. It is possible that when the country roads improve, farmers will haul in their remaining surplus, and we can estimate how much that will amount to, or whether they will sell at current rates. It may be that considerable wheat is held by persons able to hold for better prices. From this until barvest it is possible that home domand will have more to do with prices than foreign quotations. There are three wooden FLOUR-In jobling lots standard brands, \$6; best ships in the river holding for 50s freight, but no one can offer a vargo for one ship at the present time

There does not some to be any surplus in POTATOES-Quotable at 65e70e b bush, choice, sight abroad more than will be required before next harvest, but the American supply is the unknown quantity that makes the problem of supply and demand of breadstuffs difficult of solution. With the opening of spring navigation all the wheat in the West will be set loose and started towards Europe, and the supposition that the American supply will prove large, helds the market down.

We hear of decreased acreage in England, and some found hopes on this report that the demand will improve prices another year, but much depends on the condition of the crops everywhere, and a great deal depends upon the business cutlook. Depression of trade in England will doubtless continue, for it results from conditions that only time and enterprise can change. If business remains dull there, and all industries continue depressed with the people who are our best customers, we need not expect high prices for bread to rule, unless a remarkable deficiency in crops shall occur.

Another point that may be and probably will be against us in another season is, that we cannot expect to secure freights at the remarkably low figures that have ruled the past winter and fall. But we may confidently hope for abundant crops, and that will improve our circumstances if we have only fair average prices.

Col. Farish told us, some weeks since, that he was about to secure correct quotations for Oregon wheat in his cable dispatches, and since last week the market quotations from Liverpool, furnished by him, show the advance paid for Oregon wheat in comparison with California wheat. We commend the enterprise of Col. Farish in that matter. For years past the WILLAMETTE FARMER has been the only journal that has given true quota tions for Oregon wheat, and our showing of the facts has doubtless caused correct quotations to be furnished. We are modest enough to want all the credit that belongs to us.

THE WOOL MARKET.

The wool market interests many of our readers who own sheep, and will soon have their annual clip to dispose of. The Commercial Herald of April 3d says:

"The spring clip is now arriving to some extent from various localities. The market price has not yet been fully established. Buyers do not appear at all anxious to pur-chase at prices demanded by receivers. Prices promise to open low, and the following figures may approximate current rates: Southern, from Los Angeles and vicinity, 8@12c for burry; Northern State, short staple, 9@14c; good to choice free, 16@18c. These are only nominal rates pending actual sales. We hope next week to have something reliable to present to our readers." sent to our readers.

The Boston Shipping List of March 15th

"Holders are anxious to close up stocks as fast as possible, and responsible buyers find no difficulty in purchasing at concessions. The most marked decline is in Texas, Oregon and California wools, sales of these wools having been made at comparatively low prices. Parties who have carried California wool since hast Spring are now selling at a loss of 46:5c t b; several lots have been taken during the week at the prices paid in San Francisco nearly a year ago, holders here submitting to the loss of freight, interest, storage, shrinkage and other expenses, equal to about 5c \$\psi\$ lb. The only possible chance for any favorable change is that goods may take a start in the Spring, but there is no indication at present that this change will take place, as goods are moving off slowly at low and unsatisfactors prices. The starks on and unsatisfactory prices. The stocks on hand are not large for the season, and some dealers have been forced to buy to keep up assortments, but this is offset by the fact that a few manufacturers, who have more stock on hand than they require, are sellers of wool instead of buyers. The stocks, however, are believed to be quite ample to bridg over to another clip, and buyers are quite in-different about intere supplies. There has been more doing in Texas, Colorado, Oregon and unwashed and unmerchantable fleeces, the sales comprising 535,000 fb at various prices as to equality and condition, but geterally understood at low figures compared with previous transactions. In California fall and spring there has also been a fair business doing.

That is as much as we can give in the way of information this week, and we regret that the outlook has not more promise in it.
