BRURSDAY MORNING, May 15, 1879.

There are no transactions in wheat, nor movements in wool. Dispatches show an excitement in Chicago on the unfavorable condition of the growing wheat crop in the northwest, while other dispatches claim the weather favorable in northern Iowa and Wisconsin. Wool is inactive, no receipts and no fixed

price. Twelve to sixteen cents per pound may be considered the range of the market. We publish extracts from the wool circular

of Messrs. DuBois & King, as fellows:

Last year, the season opened in San Francisco at 19c. to 20c. for average staple free wool, and for extra light parcels, 22c. Long staple free wools were sold at 26c. to 22c. The best northern wools brought 25c. to 26c. In Oregon, the best Umpqua clips were bought for 22c. to 23c.; long staple, fine fibre, light-conditioned wool selling up to 24c. Some of these wools, both California and Oregon, were shipped and stored in New York, carried until a few weeks since, and then sold at a few cents advance on purchase prices. The result of last year's business has been ruin to many dealers, serious embarrassment to others, and heavy loss to all who touched the market. This is more or less true of each season since 1873. Time was when manufac-

turers were coining money. They eagerly took all offerings at full market prices, and carried the stock for a year; but as the production of woolen fabrics has so far outron the demand, all this is changed. Factory property is offered at ten per cent. of its cost, and finds no buyers. Manufacturers are, for the most part, involved and unable to carry stocks beyond current requirements, and leave dealers to shoulder the load. The production of wool in the United States is greatly on the increase. In California, the clip is estimated at 6,000,000 pounds more than last season's, when it reached nearly 42,000,000 pounds. Toxas, Colorado and other Western States will show a larger increase. Farther east low prices do not deter

wool-growers from increasing their flocks. In the English colonies, good wools are sold at 12c., and the increase is steady. The Cape of Good Hope is a large producing region. Wools from there are highly esteemed in the London market, and the best of them are sold at 6d to 61d at the Cape. They are finding their way into the Boston market and New England mills, competing with other domestic fleeces, even after paying a heavy duty to

These facts will explain why the San Francisco market opened, nearly a month ago, so dull, with prices so far below the level of a year age. For the defective wools first arriving, there was absolutely no demand. No dealer would touch them, even at low prices. Later, when free, bright, fine wools came in, Eastern buyers took them slowly and cautiously at 12c. to 14c., fully 6c. below last season's prices. In the northern counties of that State, late rains retarded shearing, and at this date but little has been done in these wools. There is no eagerness to secure the new arrivals. At low prices, there is a fair demand for good parcels; but any show of firmness on the part of holders is met by indifference from buyers. Light, bright, free wool, eight or ten months' growth, strong staple and fine fibre, can be sold at 17c. to 18c. but higher than this no one is new willing to

venture. Oregon's clip of last season amounted to ver 6,000,000 pounds. In valley wools there has been considerable improvement of late years. Many of these fleeces prove attractive to the most fastidious buyers. Long Combing and Delain wools are sure to catch the eye of whatever buyers enter the market; and when healthy, bright and long in staple, fine in fibre, will command top prices. Coarse, wiry fleeces, heavy and burry wools are likely to sell slowly and at very low prices; but from the Willamette, Umpqua and Klickitat valleys, and many other localities in Eastern and Western Oregon and Washington Territory, we hope to see clips that will bring, if not high, at least fair prices in these dull times.

We would call the attention of growers to the necessity of shipping their wool to market in good order. The success of a sale depends parcel that we can hardly recommend too strongly that care be exercised in this matter. Grade all fleeces so far as possible. All defeetive, heavy and buck's fleeces should be packed each separately. All extra choice should be put apart, and the whole clip invoiced accordingly. Tags should be carefully removed from the fleece and rejected. All sales are made subject to rejection of every inferior fleece or part of one. Every fleece is opened and repacked by buyers. They are too careful to pay freight on trash, if gotten for nothing; and it would be well for farmers to be as wise. Then tie all fleeces neatly and ingly eareful in their movements; holders are free for poor ones, and the looks spoil chances of sellers; market quotable 10:215 ets for midland, 14 ets | sale. By so doing, Oregon wool growers will good, 16:rfs ets, chocke, 19:rg0 ets; fancy retain the good reputation already gained for their product.

The Commercial Reporter puts up the wheat market situation as follows: Immediately following our last week's issue the English and also Eastern markets began to improve, but at the close are quiet but steady. With us there is hardly sufficient wheat available to make a market, causing values to be irregular and range as high as \$1.65 and as low as \$1.55. Some very choice samples commanding even above \$165 to millors for mixing.

The Reporter also says that the American ship Wildwood is taken for Liverpool at the same rate given for the American ship Gari-babli, 42s iid. This leaves only one sail ver-sel in port disengaged. Our San Francisco advices report that market very dull.

The Olympia Transcript says: The Nool suck settlement is the upper settlement on the Nooksack river, a distance of 25 miles from the mouth and 18 miles from Whatcom by supon read. The river can be made navigable to this place with little improvement in the way of removing jams, snags, etc. We have got up a subscription here and about 300 days work beside some money subscribed, which will be expended on the river as soon as the people are done planting. There is a splendid opening here for a man of small capital to put up a grist and saw mill, and grow up with the country. There is plenty of good land vacant awaiting settlers.
