COMMERCIAL.

THURSDAY MORNING, May 22, 1879. THE WHEAT MARKET

Remains without change. The Wildwood, chartered by Baltour, Guthrie & Co., will foad with 1,400 tons of wheat and part of a cargo of Salmon, for United Kingdom. The wheat part of it comes from the Upper Country, and part is the remainder of stocks held in this city. This fairly cleans out what is held by Portland warehouses and leaves no wheat in store here. Mesers. Allen & Lewis inform us that considerable wheat remains in valley warehouses. The Farmers' Warehouse at Salem has as much as 20,000 bushels, and the Albany warehouse has as much, and it is thought that the aggregate stored may make a hundred thousand bushels or three thousand tone, enough to load two ships of 1500 tons each. Whether this can be depended on for shipment or will be needed by millers, remains to be seen. The latter are pretty well supplied, but are in the market to secure choice lots. It is likely that as roads improve and farmers finish spring work they will hand in small lote that will supply the local demand until harvest, so we may calculate that this valley holds 3,000 tons for shipment, with something more to come

WOOL OPENS UP RETTER.

The agents of Eastern manufacturers are in San Francisco bidding against each other for choice lots, with the naunt result of advance in price in consequence of the sharp competition. Allen & Lewis have received vance in price in consequence of the sharp competition. Allen & Lewis have received

small lots of choice Eastern wools and shipped to San Francisco, where it will command 20 cents per lb. Eastern wools are in good order this season, with less dirt than usual, probably because the rains have been more plentiful. The best northern California wools, fine clothing grades, are quoted at 186922 ets per lb, and our best Umpqua flocks will probably compare with the best northern California. Mesars. DuBoise & King inform us that these quotations are furnished them from California, and that even a higher figure has been paid for fancy lots, extra fine and in prime order (trimmed well, etc.) We would arge on wool growers to pay more attention to the order in which wool comes to market, as it is desirable to establish a reputation for carefulness in that

respect. The market, then, stands this way: The sharp competition in California is occasioned by the more active demand at the East, the learing out of old stock and the demands of manufacturers. California shears early and supplies the demand. Last year California wools sold high and the market reacted later, so that when Oregon wool was ready the demand had somewhat quieted. Many predicted that such will be the case this year and that the market cannot be depended on for a nonth to come.

Koshland Bros., and DuBoise & King give us 15@18c as figures at which wool can be quoted here. This is in the absence of actual transactions, predicted upon the San Francisco and Eastern markets. These figures apply to fine wools only, as coarse wools are neglected. As to the future of the market, we recognize that the increased activity in the woolen manufactories at the East indicate permanent improvement, and while the market is now stimulated by competition and speculation, it is as possible that it will realize an advance as a decline, but the results of several years past have shown that it has declined after the wool season was partly over. As most of our wools cannot find their way to market for a few weeks, we cannot belp but take the chances.

THE DEMAND FOR PERD, Oats and hay, is chiefly local. Oats for consumption here may be quoted at 45 cents a bushel sacked, with few shipments, not a very active market, and oats not abundant. Hay is jobbed off at \$20 a ton, and jobbers buy as low as possible.

Potatoes are not over-abundant, and 60 ents a bushel is the average price. Apples are out of the market. Eggs are worth 20 cents a dozen, and roll butter from the country ranges from 15 to 18 cents a pound.

Braft Horses.

The Belgians and the French are not at all agreed as to what constitutes a good draft horse; both parties apparently lose eight of the class of work the animal is required to parform. The strong, but light and quick trotting horse of railway cars and parcel's carts, is evidently what captures the French tastes; on the other hand the Belgians say, we do not deny the attributes required for horses for such work, but for the ordinary cart or wagon horse, slowness, volume, calmness, and uniformity of movement, are essential. Some years ago the busses of Paris were drawn by Brotange horses; to these succooded the pretty and swift Percheron; to-day, the vehicles are yoked by the largest Percherons obtainable. It is worthy of note; that at the late International Horse Show, the Belgian stallions that were not honored with prices were at once purchased by French breeders. It is no secret that a horse working at a walking pace will execute more work -four times as much according to some authorities than a horse which works in trotting. Fournier's tables prove that a horso moving at work at the rate of 3,200 metres per hour will possess more staying power, more work, than one with a movement six times in excess. Resistance increases with rapidity. Every one knows how rough starts and jerks injure horses. Koppe maintained that a single excessive effort used a horse more than six months of ordinary work. The French commence to devote more attention to the breeding and rearing of horses for the cavalry; when destined for the light divisions of the latter, they ought to take a leaf out of the books of Bavarian agriculturists, whose horses combine the two-fold advantage of excellence for draft and the saddle. French Letter in American Farmer.

Tue top of a fruit tree, to secure the best results in color and flavor of the fruits, should be kept open to the admission of air and sun light. If some branches grow too fast for the harmonious balance of the tree, pick out the buds at the end and thus force the growth into the other branches that are not so thrifty. Five years of cultivation and watchful pruning and you will never have occasion to remove large branches. It is a terrible loss to a tree to allow branches to attain a large size only to be slaughtered.






