Since for really good wool.

Willamette and Umpqur wools may be quoted at 21c6:23c per lb, latest advices. It must be remembered that these figures are given for good to fancy lets, and that poor grades are neglected. Hitherto there has little distinction been made with regard coarse and fine wools, but dealers impress upon our minds the fact that all that is changed the present year, and the demand is strictly for finer grades. They also inform us that lots of wool sold to eastern buyers in San Francisco are contracted for subject to grading and rejections of inferior wools come back on the sellers hands; also that GOOD CURE for HARD TIMES wool is classed according to the order in which it is found, so that it is desirable that all wood producers should see that fleeces are properly trimmed, and in decent condition as to cleanliness, before sending to market.

In this connection we cannot but hope that wheat and wool buyers will bereafter insist on both products being in good order. If we ship wheat badly cleaned, or wool that is foul with dirt, any sensible man must see, in a moment, that the producer will be the ultimate loser. No shrewd merchant will buy dirt and pay for it. If our farmers and wool-growers wish to command a good price they must sell good goods. We desire to impress on the mind of every man that his reputation, and the reputation of the State ought to have a cash value, and if the reputation of our products is not favorable we shall be losers by it. If buyers have lost heavily on Oregon wheat and wool not well cleaned, as many claim, they have a right to insist on more care on the pert of producers, or a reduction in price.

LOUAL MARKETS.

Oats are scarce and the supply is probably restricted by continued wet weather. Potatoes are scarce, though not in active

demand, worth 65 cents per bushel. The market for dried fruits is dull. Sundried apples sell as low as four and five cents per pound, and Plummer-dried apples and pears do not yet command more than seven cents in San Francisco. Sun-dried plums in San Francisco are worth eleven to twelve cents, and no reliable quotations for Plummer-dried plums.

THE WET SEASON.

The continued wet weather is very discouraging to trade and creates fears that the crop may suffer injury. Reports received by Farish's shipping intelligence office yesterday, which we publish elsewhere, show that as yet, crop prospects are considered excellent, unless the continuance of rains causes future injury, which we may hope will not be the

CROP PROSPECTS.

Through Farish's market reports and alagping intelligence we glean the following

Salem, May 27-A few of the farmers in the very low lands did not get in as many acres as they intended, but so far as I am able to learn the rains have done no injury to the grain in the aggregate. The yield will more than compensate for the less on account of not getting all the ground in. Most of the grain looks remarkably well, with few exceptions, and total yield will be more than for many years. The only danger is if it continnes to rain it will grow too rank.

Albany, May 28.—The universal opinion is that prospects for grain crop was never better, and fully 95 per cent. of ground sown with no damage yet. The only possible chance of damage will be from continuous rains or from a sudden change to continued hot weather, which would cause rust, Fully 40 per cent, more grain sown this year than ever before. Farmers are very hopeful and entertain no fears except from a continued hot sun after this continued rain. This in cludes the entire county.

Eugene City, May 28 .- It is the opinion of the most reliable men that if rains should stop now that there would be an excellent crop. If rains centinue there is danger of grain growing too rank and not filling. In very low places fall grain and some Spring grain is drowned out. Spring sowing on high rolling lands look very fine and promises a large crop. Still raining very hard here.

Roseburg, May 28. Best informed parties say the rain has done no harm.

Cornelius, May 27. Grain already sown, both fall and Spring looks very good. If weather continues good, prospect is fair for late sowing. Usual amount of acreage already sown. General out-look better than last year.


