Population of Chicago. CHICAGO, June 30.—Superintendent of Census Wright reports that late returns have so far exceeded estimates that the actual figures in hand at the close of office hours to-night add up within a few hundred of 400,000 as the population of Chicago. Other returns will increase this total, but to what extent it is not known.

Haces at Chicago. CHICAGO, June 30.—The first race at the Jockey Club track today was a 1 1/4 mile dash for 4-year-olds and upwards for a purse of \$250. Blue Lodge won; Florence, 2d; Omega, 3d; time, 2:15.

Fatal Shooting Affair. DENVER, June 29.—This afternoon a shooting affair occurred at Buena Vista, resulting in the death of a gambler known as "Hoo-Do" Brown and probably fatally wounding "Curly Frank," another gambler. The shooting was caused by a dispute over a game of cards.

Miss Louise Stager, daughter of Gen. Anson Stager, of the Western Union Telegraph Co., was married this evening to Frank S. Gordon, a merchant of New York. The ceremony took place at the residence of the bride's father.

Census of Louisville. LOUISVILLE, Ky., June 30.—The census returns give the city 120,650. It is generally believed that it should be 10,000 or 20,000 more.

Sanctuary for Refugees. CHICAGO, June 30.—It is understood that the various telephone systems in use in Chicago are to be consolidated under one management and a preliminary agreement has been signed.

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War on the Adams Express Company. LOUISVILLE, July 2.—On the Louisville, Nashville and Chattanooga railroads from today the Adams express will be charged passenger fare, and express matter carried by the Adams company will be charged to them at regular schedule rates. In other words, the Adams company will be treated the same as private individuals.

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Mary, owned and run by Capt. Halstead, exploded her boiler, completely wrecking the boat which sunk immediately. The following is list of killed and wounded: Wm. Chadwick, engineer of the Mary, instantly killed; John Stewart, pilot of the Mary, fatally injured and dying; E. S. Perkins, fireman of the Mary, scalded about the face and neck; Frank Adams, chief clerk of the St. Louis Hotel, scalded and hurt in the eye; A. S. Diamond, of Minneapolis, shocked and prostrated; Colored Jim, porter at the St. Louis Hotel, scalded and bruised; Lang, porter at the St. Louis Hotel, scalded and injured; Harry, a colored boy, very badly hurt—arm dislocated and badly scalded; English George, scalded and bruised. The boat was on her way to Waysanta to take on board 100 excursionists, and had stopped at the St. Louis Hotel en route. The Mary has for a long time been considered an unsafe boat. Her boiler is the third of the same make that has exploded on the same lake in the last three years, each time with fatal results. It is claimed that there was but 60 pounds of steam in the boiler at the time of the explosion, and plenty of water.

Grant at Kansas City. KANSAS CITY, Mo., July 2.—General Grant and party arrived here last evening and were enthusiastically received by about fifteen thousand people. Gen. Grant responded at some length to the welcoming address of Governor St. John.

Missed Passengers Found Injured. COLLEGE POINT, L. I., July 3.—William Nicholas, of Seacuff, Mrs. D. Meisner, Mrs. Throp, and Mrs. Annie Simoner, all of Glen Cove, who were among the missing passengers of the Senawahaka, were found uninjured, except Mrs. Meisner, who sustained internal injuries.

Foreign. Banquet to the Riflemen. DUBLIN, June 30.—About 100 gentlemen sat down to a banquet given to-night to the American and Irish teams by the Lord Mayor of Dublin. After the royal toast, Barrows, United States Consul, responded to a toast to President Hayes and the American Nation, and Col. Bodine replied to that of "Our Guests, the American Team." Major Leach made a speech on behalf of the Irish riflemen.

Foreign. Shooting at Dublin. Several members of the American and Irish teams took part in competing for a cup and several minor prizes. There were 34 competitors. Conditions—800 yards with any rifle, ten shots each. The American competitors were Rathbone, Brown, Scott, Farrow, Jackson, Rockwell, Fisher and Laird. Laird made three bull's eyes, winning the first prize. Murphy won the second prize, Cogan the third and Fenton the fourth. Farrow on a tie beat Millier, taking the fifth prize.

Foreign. Management Criticized. DUBLIN, June 30.—There is much complaint at the manner in which the rifle match was conducted, especially that there seemed more desire on the part of the managers that more care was taken that nobody should pass in front of the Lord Lieutenant, than that the competitors should be entertained, the press accommodated fairly, or the marksmen be decently attended.

Foreign. Registration of Riflemen. The removal of Registrar Kaplan by Governor Perkins to be made next Tuesday is the subject of much comment. Kaplan will not give way, unless the courts compel him. He will stick by the advice of leading Democrats.

Foreign. A License Awarded. The Jefferson Street Ferry Company's Application for a Franchise Granted. Yesterday afternoon was the time set for the County Commissioners to render the decision on the application of the incorporators of the Jefferson Street Ferry Company for a franchise to conduct their transit line across the Willamette river from the foot of Jefferson street in this city to East Portland.

Foreign. Eastern Affairs. CONSTANTINOPLE, July 3.—It is currently reported that orders have been given for mobilization of the second army corps. It is believed here that the Porte is determined to resist the decision of the powers. It is also believed that Greece will imitate the example of Montenegro and not attempt to take forcible possession of the ceded territory.

Foreign. Sale of Blooded Cattle. CHICAGO, July 2.—The Oakwood herd of short horns was sold at Dexter Park to-day. There were 30 head which sold for a total of \$60,250. The Gabilan herd of eight head sold for \$11,000. They were the property of J. D. Carr, of Gabilan, Monterey county, California.

Foreign. St. Louis Convention. INDIANAPOLIS, July 2.—At a meeting held here last night by the Irish American Republican Club, Messrs. Norris and Norran, of Chicago, were present. It was found inexpedient on account of the advanced state of all outside arrangements to postpone the date for holding their convention, which will therefore be held on the 14th of July, as advertised, without fail.

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Pacific Coast. The New Charter to be Rejected. SAN FRANCISCO, July 1.—The new charter is published in the Chronicle and Call to-day. It is generally believed it will be rejected by the voters at the election September 8th.

Pacific Coast. Enthusiasm for Hancock. An immense meeting of the Workingmen who favor Hancock was held at Union Hall last evening. Fully five thousand were present and great enthusiasm prevailed. The great mass of the Workingmen will support Hancock, but will maintain their local ticket.

Pacific Coast. The Bank of California has attached the Guadalupe Quicksilver Mining Company for \$125,775. Other attachments avail the total to \$155,000.
