

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The War in Egypt. ALEXANDRIA, July 23.—Arabi Pasha has no intention of advancing on Alexandria.

Berlin, July 23.—The Prussian Cross Gazette, in an article on the policy of Germany, says the maintenance of the former state of things is impossible, since Egypt has practically fallen under the dominion of England.

ALEXANDRIA, July 23.—3:15 A. M.—The khedive has signed a decree dismissing Arabi Pasha and declaring him a rebel.

CONSTANTINOPLE, July 23.—The conference will probably set Monday, when Assuram Pasha will claim the presidency and propose that sittings in future be held on a steamboat instead of at the Rapia.

Berlin, July 23.—A dispatch says that Russia appears, from language accredited or given to the government, to demand that England before any action on the assumption that the Porte has actually declined to send troops to Egypt, shall come to an agreement with the other powers.

LONDON, July 23.—The Observer, in a special edition, prints the following: A proclamation, issued by the khedive, asks the people to assist the English, who, it says, are promoting the real interests of Egypt.

LONDON, July 22.—The Times says the force for Egypt will be 10,000 men, and with troops already sent make 14,000 men.

WASHINGTON, July 23.—Attorney General Brewster has decided on the question of George William Curtis and Representative Hubbell regarding political assessments that congressmen are not United States officers, and gifts from them for campaign purposes don't fall within the statute.

Report of the Advisory Commission. NEW YORK, July 22.—The report of Allen G. Thurman, T. B. Washburne and Thos. M. Cooley, who constituted the advisory commission on differential rates by trunk lines between the west and the seaboard, and who have been in session in this city several weeks past, was made known this evening.

Trouble in China. SAN FRANCISCO, July 23.—From a late copy of the Shanghai Mercury, received per steamship City of Peking, it is learned that very serious trouble has arisen at Ningpo, China, and the foreign community placed in a position of peril.

Canadian Pacific. NEW YORK, July 25.—A dispatch from Winnipeg, received by J. S. Kennedy & Co., agents of the Canadian Pacific railroad in this city, from George Stevens, president of the company, says: "I have just returned from the end of the track, which is now 295 miles west of Winnipeg. Contractors are now laying from three to four miles per day, and barring accidents, I have no doubt of our completing 500 miles of main line of track this season, bringing locomotives 50 miles west of Stakatchewan river by December next.

Half Breeds Must Go. The President is said to have adopted a new rule which will soon result in placing only stalwarts in office. Where a stalwart's term expires he will reappoint him, and when anti-stalwarts' terms expire, he will reappoint them.

Railroad Accident. CINCINNATI, July 24.—A collision occurred on the Little Miami railroad near Foster's crossing, on a dangerous embankment, between the express from the east and a freight train.

Victoria Election. VICTORIA, July 25.—The provincial election came off yesterday. Victoria returned Beaven, government, Davis and Drake, opposition, and Duck, independent.

It is certain Arabi will destroy Cairo unless defeated and captured. In reply to a proclamation of the khedive, Arabi appointed a ministry of his own at Cairo. Preparations are made to attack Aboukir, and Arabi is moving portions of his forces in that direction.

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Alexandria, July 25.—10 A. M.—Military authorities are of the opinion that Arabi Pasha will not attack the British. He, however, is strengthening his position every hour.

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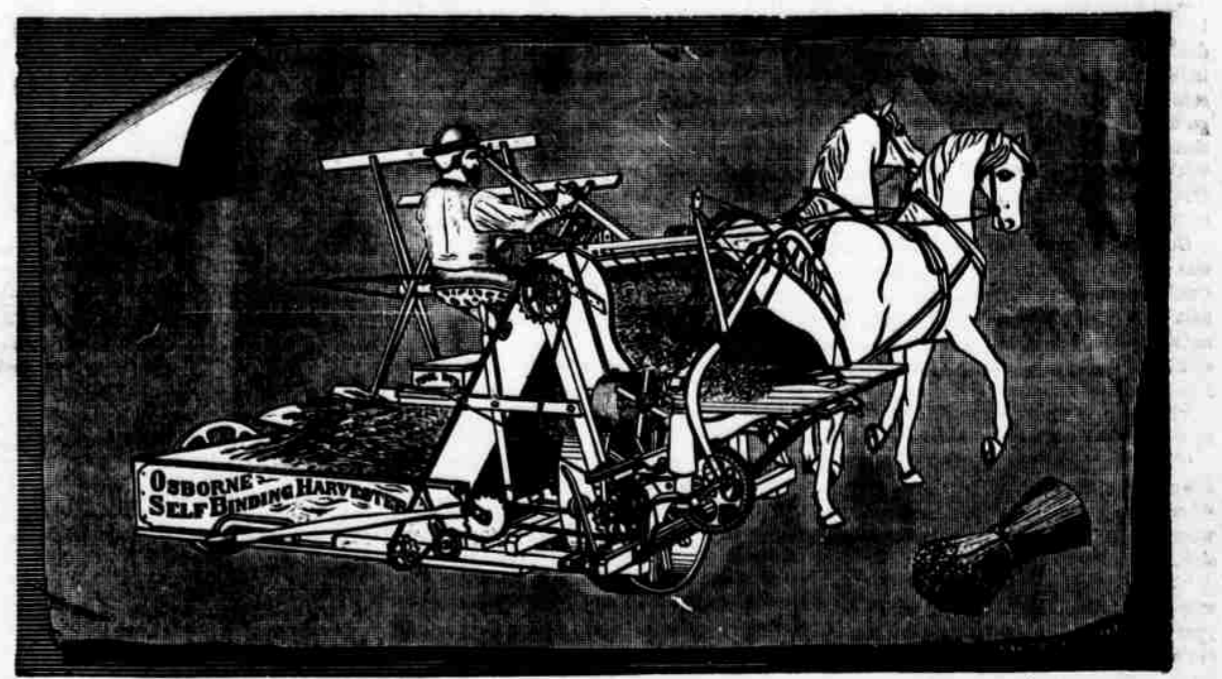
