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TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

Probably a Sensation.
 NEW YORK, Oct. 5.—The Graphic's Washington special says the approaching session of the supreme court of the United States, which begins next Monday, was the means today for unearthing an incident in the history of Associate Justice Stephen J. Field, which has probably not yet been published.
 Passing down the avenue your correspondent was called by a dealer in fire arms, sporting traps and other paraphernalia, and asked if he had seen the infernal machine that had been sent to Judge Field. He was taken into the rear of the store and a case of daguerotypes was discovered lying upon the counter.

"Examine this," said the dealer, "and tell me what you think of it."
 Close inspection showed that concealed in this case were ten metallic cartridges with the sides filled, exposing powder, and neatly imbedded in wax. An ordinary piece of sandpaper was connected with the rasp of the case, which if opened from the front would cause the ignition of a bundle of matches. The case, however, had been opened from the back, and the infernal instrument had failed to accomplish its design.

A clipping from a newspaper pasted in the box detailed an account of a decision by Judge Field regarding the title of a certain property in San Francisco, and it is supposed that the machine was a contrivance of some disappointed litigant.

Further inquiry showed that the package came by mail but was regarded with suspicion by the inmates of Judge Field's residence and the parcel was placed over night in a pail of water, after which it was pried open from behind and the deadly nature of its contents disclosed. Had any one forced the clasp open, as is the custom in handling small cases of this kind, nothing short of a miracle could have prevented the discharge of the metallic cartridges.

The Mystery Explained.

DENVER, Sept. 30.—A Tribune Leadville special says: Last May, General Ward, in one of the Duquoin Mines, on Fryer Hill, was "held up" and robbed of \$1700 while returning from town. The police next day captured two men, who were placed in jail. Shortly after this, a party of miners went to work getting out one of their comrades, who had fallen down the shaft of the Chimney Mine, they found a coat and hat belonging to Ward. A sickening odor arose from the water in the bottom of the mine, where it is thought Ward's body is lying. A searching party late to-morrow, which will probably result in the solution of the mysterious disappearance of General Ward.

Clearing House Statement.

NEW YORK, Oct. 2.—The annual meeting of the New York Clearing House Association was held to-day. The manager's report showed transactions for the year \$48,147,146, an average per day of \$136,833,375. Total transactions since the 11th of October, 1883, the date of organization, \$673,339,401. Total gold coin used in settling balances since re-union—3 years, 9 months—\$258,550,000 was gold coin, \$1,255,900,000 Clearing House certificates, and \$10,469,245 legal tenders and change. The largest transaction for any one day during the year, was \$240,709,252, the 3d of January, 1882.

Convicted Murderer.

CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—A dispatch from Taylorville, Ill., says a cold-blooded murder was committed a mile north of Palmer. John Leigh and James Regby, two farmers, quarreled about the possession of some land and became involved in a law suit from which Regby came out victorious. Yesterday Leigh approached Regby and pretending that he desired to effect a peaceable settlement suddenly opened fire with a revolver, one bullet produced a fatal wound. Leigh escaped with a posse are in pursuit, and as the excitement runs high, lynching is probable. Murderers have usually escaped the law in this region.

Gray Released.

DUBLIN, Sept. 30.—Judge Lawson has ordered the release of E. Dwyer Gray on the payment of £500.

Justice Lawson, in ordering the release of Gray, pointed out that since his imprisonment considerable change for the better had taken place in the tone of his paper, the *Freeman's Journal*. The judge said the action taken by himself and the law officers had been effective in preventing the course of justice being impeded. The order of the court in regard to Gray's surties was made to prevent any publications similar to the objectionable one from appearing, but in the event of such publications hereafter the executive had the full power necessary to deal with them. He was also, he added, not without hope that a reaction would spring up against the system of crime and outrage which had long disgraced the country.

Railroad Accident.

TORONTO, Oct. 3.—A collision on the railroad at Salmon was briefly reported last night. Engineers Westlake and Fryer and their fireman and baggage men Holliday were killed. Four seriously injured passengers, names not reported, are now at Nickerson, receiving the best attention possible. The locomotives of both trains are badly wrecked. The passenger coaches are not much injured. Further particulars of the accident say the switch, which was misplaced, was turned by a green brakeman, who immediately disappeared, but went to Nickerson three hours later and gave himself up. An engineer, fireman, and baggage men were burned in the wreck, which was fanned by fresh coal in the tender. When the bodies were taken from the ruins they were scarcely recognizable. Road Car-penter Shaler, who was in the baggage car, has since died of his injuries, making six deaths by the accident. The dead men except Holliday, resided here.

Pertis of the Sea.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 6.—The American ship Haragatow which arrived here last night, 141 days from New York, reports having encountered a cyclone on the 12th of September. The gale lasted 34 hours. Portions of the rigging were carried away, and seven feet of water was in the hold at one time. The vessel narrowly escaped foundering. Captain Pierce was washed overboard, but was rescued, and a number of the crew were injured by falling spars.

The Press on Folger's Acceptance.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—Judge Folger has written his letter of acceptance and the following newspaper comments have been made:
New York Times: Unfortunately not even Folger's great ability, high character and good intentions, nor even the reasonable assurance that he will make an excellent governor in spite of the influence which has been entered in behalf of his candidacy, can suffice to the one chief objection of those who are dissatisfied that he is fixed beyond recall in the record of the past and is not in his power to be cut. The Republicans of this State were not permitted by unanimous choice, by the free exercise of delegated power, honestly and fairly executed, to nominate their own candidate for governor, and many of them feel the principle to be vindicated even more important for the time being than the excellent ideas of State and national policy which are urged in the letter of acceptance.

Evening Post: Judge Folger's letter of acceptance is an cheerful or inspiring document, and could not well be under existing circumstances. A man who feels himself obliged to make an elaborate apology to the people for being a candidate, who virtually asked them for a suspension of judgment as to the conscientiousness of his conduct in accepting the nomination, cannot be expected to be quite free from a certain depression of spirit when speaking to the public. It is the circumstances and influences surrounding him which make him and his election unacceptable to a large portion of the Republican party, and the confusion his personal feelings with regard to his candidacy therefore is rather calculated to strengthen than weaken their objections to him.

Evening Telegraph: Folger is probably wrong in his estimate of the damage which the party would have incurred by his right declaration of his nomination. He is actually in a position in which he is not to be benefited by his assenting to the consummation of acknowledged wrong.

Mail and Express: As might be expected of so brave and honest a man, he faces without fear and handles without gloves the conventional frauds that have been so dishonestly manipulated, and the misrepresented interests, general calumny and chaos, in a terse and masculine style. But this also is a disadvantage in his case. He is too direct, too honest, too straightforward. He reviews calmly the history of frauds that affected only the single matter of recommendation to the State Committee as to a temporary chairman, and that did not affect a single vote in the convention, even on the preliminary skirmish in its proceedings.

Brooklyn Times: Judge Folger accepted in a column or more, which he devoted to an apology for not declining. A sorry and discouraging prelude to his statement of principles. Accompanying the letter, the dedication from Mr. Heppner puts an additional plaintive strain into the sad dirge over the stalwart methods and mismanagement, the fatal policy of administration that will live in history as having marked the "rule and ruin" era on the records of the Republican party.

Brooklyn Eagle:—Mr. Folger's letter accepting the so-called Republican nomination is one of the most extraordinary documents in our political literature. Never before has it been the duty of a candidate for a great office to present himself as an apologetic for an acknowledged fraud in the convention that submitted his name to the people and beg voters to believe that while forced by a stress of circumstances to figure as a representative of such a body he had no hand in debauching its character. The turn of affairs imposes upon Democrats an exceptional responsibility. It is their highest duty now to believe in their nominating conventions as will later, or in the management of the State, give no Republican cause to regret the spirit with which he struck down wrong-doers in his own party.

New York, Oct. 6.—William Curtis in a letter to the secretary of the New York civil service association says that Judge Folger's ability and character are not in question, but his nomination is; that the nomination was procured by the combined power of fraud and patronage and to support it at the polls would be to acquiesce in fraud and patronage as legitimate forces in the nominating convention. Every good citizen is bound to resist to the utmost, such wrong to free institutions and the only effective way in which voters can be emancipated from the corrupt and debasing rule of the machine is to defeat all candidates of this class. I believe this will be done decisively by the Republican voters of New York and Pennsylvania at the election this Autumn. They will see their party defeated rather than the success of fraud and corruption of patronage. This is an evil which will end in violence unless conclusively eradicated by the people at the polls.

The Evening Journal, a Republican paper of Schuylker county, start d by friends of Garfield, two years ago, refuses to support the Republican State ticket.

Going for Illinois.
 CHICAGO, Oct. 3.—The Democratic State Central Committee, in session here this afternoon, decided to make a push for the control of the next State legislature by nominating two out of three representatives in districts where hitherto, under a minority presentation, they have been content to elect one Independent. In Democratic districts they will nominate full representation.

OFFICER BARRY SHOT.
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He Arrests a Thief who Shoots Him Through the Elbow and Makes His Escape.
 On Friday morning the STANDARD gave an account of the stealing of a case of cigars from Joe Watson's saloon, on Morrison street. The parties were seen and a description furnished the police, who have for several days been shadowing the parties suspected. One of them is a fellow known as "Red Ryan," who jumped the chain gang here some time ago, and the other an ex-convict from San Quentin. During the daytime they loitered around the streets dressed in old clothes, and looked like laborers out of a job, but in the evening they would put on their "store clothes" and visit various congenial haunts. Last evening they were tracked to a room on Third street, and officers Barry and Hollen-berg sent to arrest. They were captured while in the act of changing their clothing, and the officers started with them for the police station. On the way there Barry's prisoner, the ex-convict drew a pistol and shot him through the left elbow, inflicting a very painful wound, and then succeeded in breaking away. Red Ryan at the same time attempted to break from Hollen-berg, but did not succeed and he was safely landed in a cell at the city jail. Barry's wound was excruciating.

Amimed by Dr. Gibbons at the elbow joint, but it was not possible at the time to say what bones were injured. Barry was taken home in a carriage. On reaching the room occupied by the thieves, the cigars stolen from Watson were found, also a "sawd" bag, a valise and some clothing. Barry had been warned that the fellow he arrested was a dangerous man, but he thoughtlessly neglected to search him before starting for the station. He is now known and it is scarcely possible he can long elude arrest.

STATE NEWS.

Washington county assessments will be \$100,000 more than last year's assessments. By the financial exhibit of Baker county, its outstanding warrants and interest amount to \$29,391.66.

The annual fair of the Union County Agricultural Society was a decided success, and weather was the rule.

The number of hogs that are now being put in shape for the market in Jackson county is larger than ever before.

Sorghum mills are grinding and a large quantity of superior syrup will be made in Jackson county this fall.

A Chinaman, while at work in tunnel No. 3, was instantly killed last Monday by a bank caving in.—*Plainsdealer*.

The Baker County *Reveille* says: The Short Line Company have advertised in Halley for 200 men to work on the road at \$2.50 per day.

T. W. Allen was drowned on last Thursday in the Tualatin river, says the *Tribune*. The accident was caused by trying to swim the river in pursuit of a cow.

O. C. Perkins and Wm. H. Brown have rented the Reed hotel in Salem, and will hereafter conduct the hotel business at that place, for which they are eminently fitted.—*Roseburg Plainsdealer*.

A small detachment of United States troops are in the vicinity of Williamsport, driving stakes and surveying for the line of telegraph which will run from Corvallis to Cape Hancock via Fort Stevens.

There will be a meeting of the Fine Stock Association at Rualia's race track near Union. Large purses and a splendid speed programme is announced. The meeting takes place October 9th and continues six days.

The total tax levy for Grant county this year is 234 mills; 16 mills for county purposes, 4 for general State tax, 1 mill for insane asylum, one-half mill for payment of Indian war bonds and 3 mills for school tax. The rate is exactly the same as it was last year.

The blackleg is causing heavy loss to cattle men in Lake county now. Calves are dying from it in the Lowell valley, Sprague river, Lost river and other sections and it will no doubt reach every band of cattle in the county before it has run its course, says the *Tidings*.

TERRITORIAL.

Wheat is 57 cents per bushel at Walla Walla.

Last night at the lower end of Jefferson street, says the *Idaho Democrat*, a man was ordered to halt, and not doing so, he was shot at two or three times, but he escaped by running.

Rev. J. H. Willbur, late Indian agent at Fort Simcoe, W. T., has been appointed a minister at large by the Methodist church and will probably for a time make his headquarters at Col. Wendale.

Musicien John Grod, of the First Cavalry band, Fort Walla Walla, who has been on trial before a court martial at Vancouver barracks, on a charge of desertion, has been acquitted of the charge. He will probably be transferred to some other band.

It will be very gratifying to the majority of the public to learn, says the *Walla Walla Statesman*, that the city council have provided for carrying out the ordinance against making a cattle range of the streets of Walla Walla. A pound is to be established at once.

DEATH IN A DEN.

A Man Drops Dead in the Centennial Optium Joint from Heart Disease.

Yesterday morning at about 6 o'clock Henry Ott, second mate of the ship Dauntless, died of heart disease in a room in the Centennial lodging house, corner of Second and Morrison streets, occupied by himself and a band named Mary Ann Daley. A post mortem examination made by Dr. Rex disclosed the fact that Ott's heart was greatly enlarged and somewhat diseased, enough, in the opinion of the doctor, to be the cause of death. No traces of poison were discovered.

The coroner held an inquest, with result in a finding agreeable to the report of Dr. Rex. The Daley woman testified that the deceased had been keeping her company for a month or more, and on the morning of his death was called about six o'clock to go aboard his ship. He got up for the purpose of dressing and fell to the floor. The Daley woman spoke to him, but he did not answer, and she remained in her bed until ten o'clock, leaving her paramour to die and stiffen on the floor, while she slept off the effects of the previous night's location. On Friday morning articles with the captain of the Dauntless for the next voyage and received \$35 cash advance. He also had about \$22 in addition to the above amount. When found only \$20 were in his pockets, together with his watch. He was a naturalized citizen of Swedish descent and about thirty-five years of age. The captain of the ship will make application to the county court for the return of the \$35 advance pay.

HE MEANT WELL.

But Not Being Faced on Such Matters, He Erred in Judgment.

About a year ago the Rev. Van Dersal, of Forest Grove, and teacher in the school there, informed Capt. Wilkinson and several other gentlemen of that burg that an attack had been made on his virtue by a lady there, and to draw it mildly intimated that several of the most prominent citizens of the place had been guilty of the improper conduct. The matter created considerable excitement among the parties interested, and the church of which Rev. Van Dersal was acting pastor held a meeting and excommunicated him. He objected to the action of the church on technical grounds, claiming that the charges made were indefinite, when they certainly should have been plain enough, and asked that a council of the ministers of the Congregational denomination of this region should decide the matter. The council finished its deliberations in this city on Friday, and advised the church at Forest Grove to "reconsider the vote" by which the reverend gentleman was excommunicated and to restore him to full fellowship. Their reasons for this action are that they do not think the reverend gentleman intended to slander the parties he brought under suspicion, but that the inference he drew from the ladies' remarks were wrong. As drawing inferences rather than extending into the business of clerical gentlemen, he has certainly shown his unfitness for the profession of a preacher, and if he has no more sense than to misunderstand a lady's conversation, he is a fitter subject for an asylum than a church.

THE NEW CHARTER.

The new city charter, introduced in the senate by Mr. Hirsch, as S. B. 87, has been printed, and copies have been received here. The bill contains 33 pages. It will now receive the finishing touches and will be passed if it does not get left.

SWINDLING SWEDS.

He Collects Sundry Notes, Claiming They Were Lost, and Afterwards Sells Them.

A reward of 300 is offered for the arrest and detention of one Gus. Carlson, a Swede, who has been working in the neighborhood of Peoria, in this county, says the *Albany Herald*, for the past three or four years, and who left there for parts unknown on the 21st of September last. It seems that Carlson has been in the employ of various persons in that vicinity, but for two years past has been working for Mr. George Brattain, who, some time ago, gave him a note for \$400 in wages.

An attempt to trace Carlson has obtained notes from some other parties for whom he had worked. Among others, he held a note of Mr. Newt. Smith's for \$240, and about a year ago, claiming to have lost the note, the money was paid to him and his receipt taken therefor. Just before leaving he disposed of this note; but the purchaser will have to stand the loss, as Mr. Smith already held a receipt for the money. When Mr. Brattain wished to pay his note Carlson said he had lost it also. Coming to this city a day or two afterwards, he sold the note to Mr. John Connor for its full value, and then went back to Peoria and received the money from Brattain, giving his receipt therefor as in the other case. Having raised all the money he could in this way, Carlson left on the 21st ult., and it is not known whether he went.

Sheriff Humphrey has had bills struck off and circulated, offering the reward stated at the beginning of this article for his arrest and detention. The following description is also given: "He (Carlson) is a Swede; talks broken; 28 years old; weight, 100 lbs; light complexion; slightly stoop-shouldered; height 6 feet 3 inches; has a small hole in right side of neck about 4 inches below ear; scar made with an axe on top of one foot."

A GOOD BILL.

Below will be found the bill introduced in the House by Mr. Dunbar entitled "A Bill for An Act to prohibit the adulteration of food and drink and the manufacture of short measures and weights." It would appear that no person can have any objection to its passage except those who wish to adulterate articles of food or give short weight and measure: be it enacted by the Legislative Assembly of the State of Oregon:

SECTION 1. That the Governor shall have power to appoint an inspector of all articles of food and drink manufactured or sold in the State, that such officer shall hold office during the pleasure of the Governor.

SEC. 2. The duties of the inspector shall be to examine and, if necessary, analyze a list of articles of food or drink manufactured or offered for sale in the State, and if he find the same composed, in whole or in part, of ingredients unwholesome or detrimental to health, he shall condemn and forbid manufacture or sale of the same.

SEC. 3. Any person who shall manufacture or expose for sale, in this State, any articles of food or drink, cider, vinous, spirituous or malt liquors, adulterated with any material deleterious to health, shall pay a fine of not less than \$100 or more than \$1000, or be imprisoned in the penitentiary not less than three months nor more than one year, or both fine and imprisonment.

SEC. 4. Any person who shall manufacture, put up or expose for sale, in this State, any goods, articles or packages, measuring or weighing less than they purport, or are marked or sold for, shall be subject to a fine of not less than \$50 nor more than \$500, or imprisonment in the county jail for a term of not less than three months nor more than one year, or both.

SEC. 6. It shall be the duty of the several prosecuting attorneys of the State to prosecute all violations of this act, and complaint of violations may be, at any time, preferred by any person.

A Rich Region.

In his article on the "New Northwest," which appeared in the *October Century*, Mr. E. V. Smalley said: "South and west of Lewiston the good arable country sweeps around by the base of the Blue Mountains to Walla Walla, a distance of ninety miles. The whole fertile belt of East Washington, I have said before, may roughly be measured as two hundred and fifty miles long by fifty broad. It is all fertile, and amazingly fertile, too. There is absolutely no waste land in it, save the steep slopes of the Snake River canon. It is sparsely settled as yet, but immigrants are steadily streaming in, and it will soon contain a dense agricultural population. It is a better grain country than even Eastern Dakota, the average yield being considerably larger. Beside this magnificent farming belt, all parts of which are alike in their general characteristics of elevation, hilly surface and uniformly productive soil, East Washington contains two other fertile regions: the Big Bend country, lying in the sweep of Columbia—an extensive plain just beginning to attract settlers—and the Yakima country, a series of narrow valleys on the eastern slope of the Cascade mountains. I have not visited either of them. Both are said to be good stock and wheat sections."

DIED OF HIS WOUNDS.—Ham Johnson, a Dane, who was shot on last Friday, September 29th, by Frank Smiley, two and a half miles west of Union school house on Cedar hills, Washington county, ten miles from Portland, died on Friday evening last. Johnson was on his way to the blacksmith shop, where Smiley was employed, to have a wheelbarrow repaired, passing through a little timber to shorten his road. Hearing a wagon approaching, he was in the act of setting down the wheelbarrow until the team passed so that he would not frighten the horses, when Smiley, who was returning from a hunting expedition to the mountains, shot him, mistaking him, in the dusk, for a bear. The ball entered the back at the right shoulder blade, coming out near the collar bone and entering the head under the jaw bone, passing through Smiley then discovered his mistake and helped the wounded man to the farm house of Mrs. Barrett, about one-quarter of a mile from Johnson's own home, where, being unable to proceed further, he remained until he died. Smiley gave himself up, but the facts showed only an accident, and he was discharged. Johnson leaves a wife and two small children, one hundred acres of land. He will be buried to-day.

PRESIDENT'S ADDITION.—Robert S. Gardner, a government agent, is now at Pendleton, says the *Walla Walla Democrat*, to obtain the consent of the Umatilla Indians and have the necessary documents for setting aside 640 acres of the reservation, valued at \$30,000, to the town of Pendleton. The department will soon appoint surveyors and appraisers, and the addition will be divided up in blocks and disposed of. Mr. Gardner held council with the Indians yesterday, with what result has not yet been made public.
