LOCAL MARKETS. Reviewed and corrected weekly by J. B. Knapp, produce commission dealer, 267 First street, Portland, Oregon: Wheat.—There is little or no change to note, except there is a little better feeling, and buyers are paying a little higher than last week.

Wheat.—The market for both spot and future is strong, with a good export requirement. Speculators purchase futures more freely since the rains. The Queen of the Pacific, from Oregon, brought 4,485 sks. The receipts of wheat are not equal to those of last year by considerable.

LIVERPOOL MARKETS. LIVERPOOL, Oct. 18. Wheat—Spot market quiet but steady. California Crops and Markets. We take the following from the San Francisco Commercial Herald of October 12th:

The rainy season appears to have come upon us in good earnest, some 24 inches of rain having already fallen, which is far more than usual at this date. The grass is now coming forward rapidly, and it is fondly hoped that it may continue to grow, so as to afford needed nourishment for the cattle and sheep upon a thousand hills.

General average for seventeen years, 34 1/2 cents. Early crop sales in California were in a few instances made at 25c or less, but the price rose rapidly to 35c, and now is up to 60@62 1/2 for best brands.

Wool.—The Queen of the Pacific, from Oregon, brought 209 bales. Freight Eastward overland have again been reduced this time to 1 1/2 cts per lb on all defective wool worth under 12 1/2 cts.

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6,143 bbls. Oregon continues to send us supplies. The Queen of the Pacific brought 5,941 hf sks. The Paradox, for Sydney, carries 500 tons flour. The present price of shipping extras is \$5 25 to 5 50; extra superfine, \$4 70 to \$5; superfine, \$4 to 4 50 @ 196 lbs, all in cloth.

Hides.—We quote as follows: Heavy salted steers, 10 to 11c @ lb, light salted hides, cows and steers, 30 to 45 lbs, 9c; medium do, 45 to 55 lbs, 10c; salted kips, 10 1/2 to 11c; salted calf, good demand for plump skins, 14 to 15c; hair goat, sound skins, 65 to 70c; medium, 50c; small skins and kid, 5c to 25c each; deer skins, good summer, 35 to 37c; medium, long hair, 25 to 30c; poor and winter skins, 20c; sheep skins, shearings, 25 to 30c; short wool, 30 to 50c; medium wool, 60c to \$1; long wool, \$1 to 1 50; dry hides, usual selection, 20c; dry kip, 18c; do calf, 21 to 22c.

Hops.—The profits of hop-growing in California have been so large this year that many persons are likely to be drawn into the business. The price of hops is subject to great variations, owing to the frequent failure of crops in hop-growing countries.

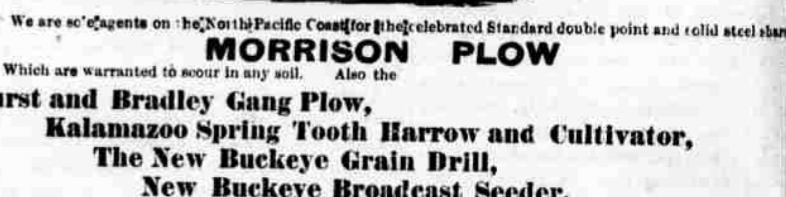
