San Francisco Tonnage Situation. SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 7.—There are now in port 55 vessels of the grain fleet, which represent 75,493 tons, with carrying capacity for 113,000 tons of wheat.

Boston Wool Market. BOSTON, Nov. 7.—The demand for wool is steadier, with good prices.

Commerce of Puget Sound. Some idea of the immense business of Puget Sound may be gathered from the statistics of trade of that region for the month of October, which are summed up in a press dispatch, dated Seattle, Nov. 2nd, as follows:

Twenty-four deep-water sail vessels, engaged in the foreign trade and in the district of Puget Sound during the month of October. They came from Mexico, the Hawaiian Islands, Peru, Brazil, Japan and Australia, and are bound, when loaded, for the Hawaiian Islands, Peru, Chili, Australia, Fiji Islands and China.

In the lumber trade of Burrard inlet during the month five vessels entered and five cleared, the latter taking about 2,500,000 feet of lumber, valued at about \$33,000.

The coal exports from this port aggregate 11,986 tons in October, all going to California. From the Benton mine 1701 tons were shipped; from the Seattle, 10,285.
