Evergreen Millet.

A correspondent of the Pacific Rural Press says: About six or seven years ago Mr. Brightman introduced a certain species of grass, which, for want of a better name, was called "Brightman's grass." Although the grass appeared to do very well on his place, there did not appear to be much desire on the part of the neighbors to give it a trial, and no one seemed to know what kind of grass it was, nor whether it was of any value as a fodder plant or not. Two years ago one of my neighbors set a few roots in his garden, where it was occasionally irrigated during the summer, when it made a very rank growth, and spreading to such extent that it was resolved to eradicate it if possible. The ground was thoroughly dug up and every root apparently removed, but all to no purpose, as it seemed to gather fresh strength, and came up stronger and more luxuriantly the following summer than ever. It was all dug up—that is, all the roots that could be found—several times during the summer, but it had come to stay there. A few days ago I called on the gentleman, and he showed me some of the roots of the so-called Brightman's grass, which I recognized as evergreen millet, as I had received some roots a year ago from the University. The gentleman in question has planted out a large tract of the same kind of grass, and is very enthusiastic about it, claiming that cattle and hogs eat both the plants and the roots with relish, and roots produce very largely, and can be plowed up every year and gathered without in any way injuring or diminishing the plant. On reasonably strong soil it grows very well without irrigation. But it should not be planted where it would not be desirable to have it at some future time.

According to the returns from the Department of Agriculture at Washington, Illinois has the largest number of horses, 1,028,094; New York the largest number of cows, 1,510,904; Texas has the largest number of oxen and other cattle, 2,277,700, and also of sheep, 7,056,275; and Iowa the largest number of hogs, 4,800,998, and also of mules, 191,917.

It is stated in French agricultural journals that French cheese makers are not satisfied unless they get from \$150 to \$200 per annum from each cow. This is owing to their expertness and thoroughness in the manufacture of cheese, and each particular agricultural district of France has attained a celebrity for the making of some particular variety of cheese, developing into a special and important industry.
