CO-OPERATION AT SALEM.

Farmers around Salem have organized a co-operative movement that is certain to succeed if conducted with prudence and business energy. They have subscribed with a capital stock fixed at \$3,000, and last Saturday, elected directors. While the stock is mostly held by grangers the company consists of farmers in general. There is no reason why any persons who desire should not take an interest. Someone enquires: "What if merchants all combine against us?" Even then the object will be attained of securing goods at a reasonable price. The intention is to sell only for cash and to charge a reasonable profit on all goods sold and, of course, to get all the trade possible, from all sources. The business will be confined to groceries and provisions. What we consider the most important feature of all is: That the same agency will be made use of to dispose of farm products. Salem offers a very

limited market for most products of the arm, the natural result of circumstances as people here need but what they use, while Portland is a large and growing place, with much trade coming from shipping and other transient sources. It will be the duty of the agent in charge to make connection with safe commission houses in Portland to receive and dispose of all products—such as butter, eggs, vegetables and fruits—that are brought into town by his customers. A good agency of this kind will be of great advantage to our neighboring farmers as the agent will be kept informed and a ways be able to give his customers the latest Portland prices for such articles.

Our friend Jno. P. Cole is talked of as a good person to take charge of the store. We believe he is the best man who can be secured, reliable in every way, energetic and competent in all respects and with such a man in charge we believe the business will be made a success, if success is possible. Under the rules adopted, there is no cause for anticipating failure.

With good men as directors, and Jno. P. Cole in charge business will be conducted well, and as all sales will be for cash and purchases made only for cash the business cannot well go behind if the subscribers will patronize their own store. At present the organization includes nearly one hundred families and it is expected to enlarge the subscription until several hundred families will be interested. If these patronize the store to the extent of \$100 each during the year it will afford a liberal profit on the investment at a small advance above cost. We commend the enterprise to the attention of all farmers who reside near Salem for it promises to pay them well in the mere matter of affording a market for their surplus product.

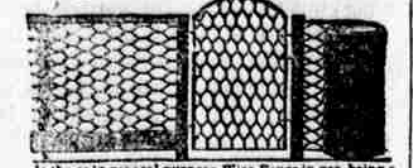
