LONDON, Aug. 2.—Market very quiet. Buyers taking only what their requirements oblige them to, while holders display indifference, waiting for something to turn up.

New York Aug. 2.—No hops, first part of September delivery can be bought here under 30c net to the grower. Market quiet. Buyers taking only requirements. Like appearing to such an extent as to injure vines. Crop estimated 20 per cent less than last year.

WATERVILLE, N. Y., Aug. 5.—Prospects of the hop harvest are encouraging. In spite of the fact that there is an increased acreage in every county, at least one-third less hops will be picked this fall than there were last fall.

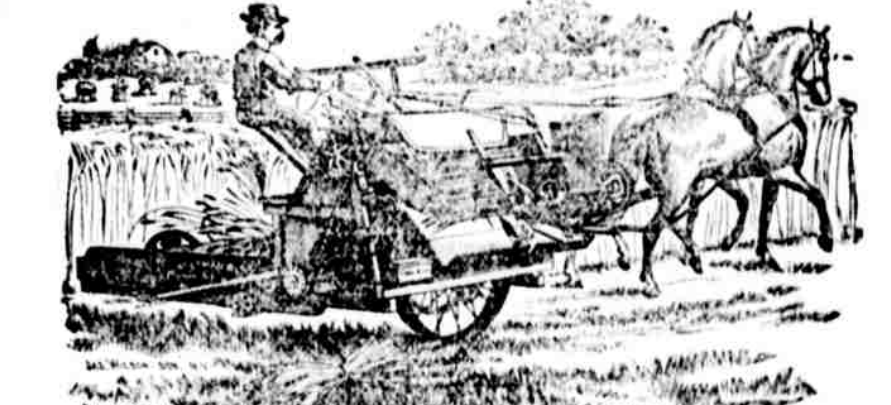
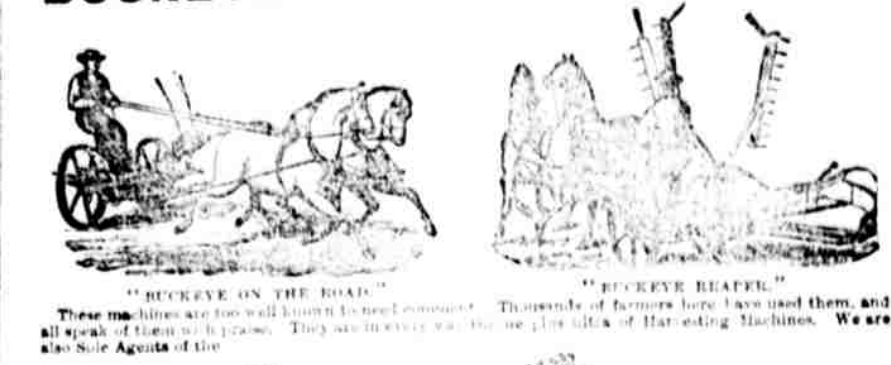
