Uses for Cottonwood.

gilead, commonly called cottonwood, growing in Oregon and on the streams "There is no need of death from here." Builder show to what good uses it can be put. That paper says:

"It does not seem safe nor wise to declare any kind of tree worthless. Even the despised basswood and cottonwood tree have become valuable. It may be and then it will be elevated to place among the now valuable trees. Late inventions and discoveries have revealed the fact that the finest polished and strongest household furniture can be made out of paper. It can be pressed so hard that no instrument but a diamond can scratch it; and it can be given the finest shades in imitation of wood, and produce cheaper than walnut, mahogany or ebony. And late dis-coveries in paper-making established the fact that cottonwood makes the whitest and strongest fiber pulp yet manufactured out of wood. There are vast quantities of pulp imported, and some newspaper men are clamoring for its being done free of duty. Paper mills in Delaware, Pennsylvania, and other Northern States, are shipping thousands of cords of poplar wood from North Carolina and elsewhere; one mill con-tracting for 30,000 cords. This is costly and shows conclusively that our rich lands, where cottonwood grows so luxuriantly, may yet become profitable fields to raise and manufacture paper furniture, car wheels and houses. Something has to take the place of pine, walnut and cherry in house building and ornamental wood-work, and the probability is that the cottonwood is the coming tree. It is easier propagated, a more rapid grower, is exempt from enemies and parasites, and is a native almost anywhere.

Vacant Government Lands

In Eastern Oregon there are still large bodies of vacant government lands awaiting settlement, and the Heppner Gazette, published near them, publishes township plats and information about new lands, besides making land filings and final proofs. 
