Curing Meat Without Brine.

The following method of dry salting is recommended for trial, by those who have heretofore cured their meats by using strong brine.

In smoking the meat, place the smoldering fire of corn-cobs dry hickory or sugar tree chips, at a sufficient distance from the meat, so that it will be slowly dried as well as smoked.

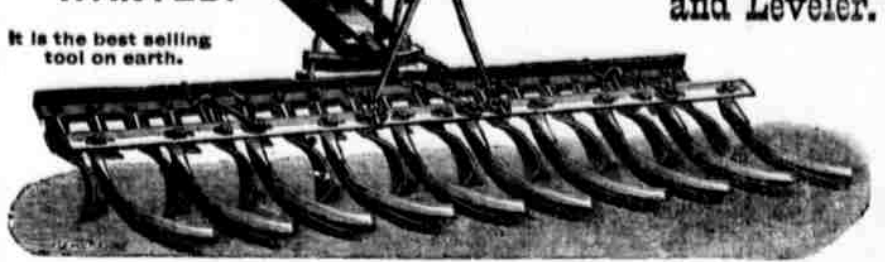
