COMMERCIAL.

THURSDAY April 29, 1886. The local wheat market is claimed to be less firm by operators. If so, it is because of lessened pressure to buy, and to an idea that prices were being unduly forced by competition. There is nothing in advices to warrant a weaker feeling here for the English markets are very firm. A choice valley grade is here quoted at \$1.271, while \$1.161 would probably be best figure for Walla Walla.

Fair to extra choice grades of Eastern Oregon are nominally quoted 14@18c, and it would be difficult to secure anything more than 18c for any grade. Orders amount to nothing and dealers consider the market as presenting very little room for remunerative speculation. This controls them and prevents extreme prices being realized. At San Francisco choice wools have met with ready sale. but other grades accumulate. At New York the market rules dull and depressed, nothwithstanding the fact that nearly all the mills are running on full time with little or no accumulation of their output. Continued liberri offerings of foreign wool, particularly Montevideo and Australia, is the chief cause of the depression, and manufactures whose machinery is adaped to the manipulation of burry material are availing themselves of the current low quotations.

The Boston Shipping List of the 16th inst, says: "So far as the market is concerned the tone is dull and unsatisfac tory. Manufacturers appear to be in no pressing want and are moving very cantiously. During the past seven weeks the sales are only about onehalf as large as last year, an indication that the labor troubles and other disturbing influences have forced manufactures to be quite consarvative in their purchases. The extraordinary amount of foreign wool received is also quite a check on active movements. Since the 1st of January, some 30,000 bales have been received at this port more than last year, and this means an increase of 12,000,000 pounds.

The local market is without change, and quotations are nomially the same as last week.

LONDON, April 24.-The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the British grain trade, says:

The weather is milder, and late seed- STOVES AND TINWARE ing is being rapidly poshed. Occasional showers would be welcome. It is feared that the wire worm will prove rather troublesome. All vegetation is exceedingly backward. Business during the past week has been of a holiday character. Trade in foreign wheats was slow, but prices were firm, owing to the smallness of imports. Prices of corn favored sellers. There were two arrivals and two sales; two cargoes were with-drawn and none remained. Trade forward is very firm. On Monday there will be no market.

Soap from Lye .-- I have tried the following recipe for a number of years, have made careful calculations as to relative cost of ingredients and hard soap from the dealer, and find quite a seving, and also make soap that will keep in the coldest or hottest weather: 2 boxes Lewis' potash, 8 lbs grease, 4 lb borax, 1 lb resin, 17 quarts water. Boil together one hour. I prefer to dissolve the potash in the water, add the grease and melt the borax and resin in a separate kettle, containing a little water.

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
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
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
