The marriage of President Cleveland and Miss Frankie Folsom will take place about the middle of June.

Special telegrams to Brad street's indicate that the general trade situation is less favorable than a week ago.

It is understood that Miss Cleveland, who has thus far performed the duties attendant upon her brother's position so acceptably, is well pleased with the prospect of his marriage.

The will of Thomas Fallon, who lately died in California and left an estate of \$300,000 was broken and decided null by the courts.

A pickpocket committed suicide in San Francisco recently—evidently hard times for him.

Sewing women of Buffalo, passed resolutions denouncing Miss Folsom for having her wedding trousseau made abroad.

The Montana Live Stock Company has been organized at St. Paul, Minn. \$250,000.

There is a general resumption of traffic commencing on all the Western roads. Every line has a large force at work this morning and in nearly every instance all freight offered is being handled.

The business failures the last seven days in the United States and Canada were 192 as against 207 last week.

Springfield, Mo., and vicinity has been treated to a disastrous rain and hail storm, doing much damage to crops and property.

Little Greece is up in arms and maintains her attitude of daring independence. The people are wild for war and Greek troops are hurrying to the front with all possible dispatch.

Powderly has issued a call for a special session of the general assembly to be held in Cleveland, Ohio, Tuesday, May 25. The cause is given as follows: First, the rapidly increasing membership of the order requires changes in the laws which the general executive board have no authority to make.

The World's Washington correspondence says: John Sherman and his friends are preparing plans to boom Sherman and Levi P. Morton for 1888.

The Republicans in Ohio Legislature having seated four Hamilton county contestants all Democrats have taken a trip over into Kentucky to break a quorum and bring Republicans to terms.

Gen. Miles is pushing a vigorous campaign against Apache hostiles and says it will be kept up until all are killed or wounded.

President Cleveland has vetoed several pension bills, for private parties, and shows that many bills thus passed have no foundation in justice.

A car with 1,500,000 young shad for Portland, Oregon, is on the way west. Half for the Columbia and half for the Willamette.

A number of socialists and anarchists have been arrested in Chicago and Milwaukee and rioting is stopped there.

A terrific storm lately devastated Kansas and Missouri doing great harm.

Northern war veterans are disgusted because Jeff Davis parades the South making speeches and saying: "The cause of the South is not dead but sleeping."

Cincinnati is under martial rule and regiments are camped ready for duty. The police having discovered that 600 socialists and anarchists are armed and have a manufactory of dynamite bombs, there measures have been taken.

During Chicago riots the mob raided a drug store and drank all the spirits found, some of them took a swig of carbolic acid by mistake and it laid them out, two dead and three more dying.

Senator Fair proposes that the Apaches be placed on Colaline island, 25 miles from shore in the Pacific, and then there will be no more summer raids.

It is rumored the President may veto the river and harbor bill, in which case our improvements will come to a stop.

It is proposed to have an international exposition in 1892 to celebrate the 400th anniversary of the discovery of America.

A disastrous fire in Honolulu caused \$1,500,000 loss. Many are homeless.

Street car men at Toronto, Canada, are on a strike.

English journals comment on the recent anarchist riots in this country by saying we should by this time have learned our mistake in opening our door to the worst element of European life.

Several vessels loaded with Alaska lumber have been seized by the revenue service, considered counterband and cut in government land.

The principal European powers have ordered a blockade of Greek ports to prevent war movements by Greece.

Gladstone has moved the second reading of the home rule bill for Ireland and made a strong speech for it. The vote will be close and many predict the bill will have to be modified or must fail.

Ex-President Arthur has fallen off from 250 to 130 pounds weight and for some weeks his friends are not admitted to see him.

The crop summary for May shows good prospects for fall and spring wheat all over the West. For the Pacific, reports show excellent for Oregon and Washington, and California claims a good crop everywhere in that State, with excellent fruit prospects.

State and Territorial News.

Messrs. Hardy, Seiben & Sweet, of Montana, will ship from Douglas county, between the 5th and 20th of May, about 6,500 head of cattle, leaving about \$150,000 in cash in this section.

Walla Walla Journal: The range horses on Eureka Flat are afflicted with a disease resembling epizootic, and some have died of it.

Portland Rural Spirit: During the past year or two the department of agriculture has been gathering facts regarding the value of the improvement in domestic stock throughout the United States. The average value of good blood, or improvement by the use of good blood, on common stock, is 35 per cent. Oregon 25, Washington Territory 24, Idaho 20. This is an average of 25 per cent, or 12 below the general average.

A Corvallis, Or., dispatch of May 7th says: Green B. Smith died at 10 A. M. to-day of consumption. He was a noted temperance man and the largest landowner in the valley. He was an Odd Fellow, and will be Sunday.

Police Judge R. V. Monteith, of Astoria, was found dead in the armory at that place. He was shot through the body. Supposed accidental.

It is proposed by the Board of Trade to make an exhibit at San Francisco of the principal products of Oregon during the national encampment to be held in that city in August. A committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements.

Miss Ella Sabin who received the Democratic nomination for school superintendent of Multnomah county, irrespective of politics, having declined Mrs. Clauson Grove has been nominated for that office and will probably be elected.

The Board of Trade, Portland, have found out that certain iron goods are sold cheaper up the Willamette than they can be laid down in Portland, as freights are lower to Eugene and other towns up valley, than to Portland, coming via Yaquina Bay, to those places. Freights to San Francisco being so low—from the East—goods reach the Willamette towns for less cost than they can be brought over the Northern lines.

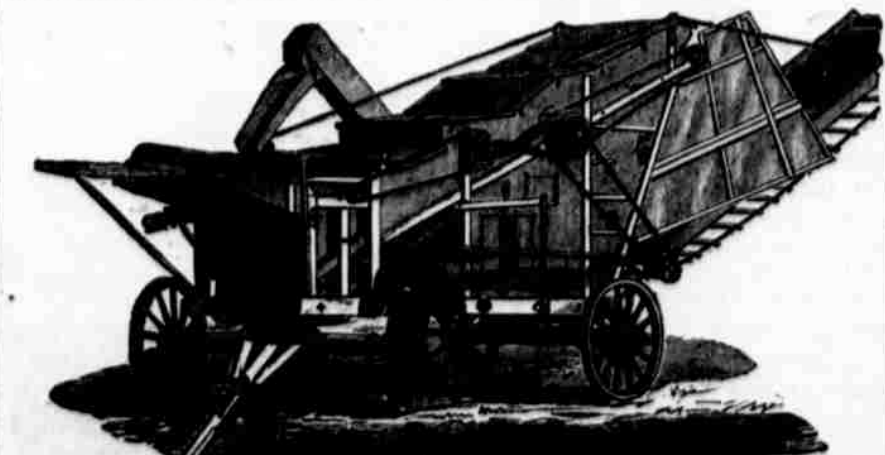
