Reports generally throughout the State report the growing crop as in unusually good condition. The showery weather for the past month has been cold and has to a certain extent retarded the growing crop.

By referring to the Mark Lane report published elsewhere, it will be seen that the foreign market is steady.

The easy feeling among local buyers is extending into bids and valley offered at \$1.27 1/2 found no buyers. Offers now are not in excess of \$1.26 which figure has not brought out sellers.

Receipts of Eastern Oregon wool are noted. But we hear of no shearing in the valley as the weather has been too cold. The Portland market is generally appearing better.

In oats sales are reported to-day of good feed at 41@42c for local needs, and shippers will not go this high.

The potato market is dull, as there is only the local trade to supply, say 20 to 30c per bushel.

Egg stocks are low and receipts are light and market steady at 15c per doz. Chickens have ruled low of late and while \$4@5 is still quoted few lots bring more than \$3.50.

Dealers and receiving plenty of local butter, and it is generally in good shape and fair to choice quality. Quote fair to choice, 15@25c per pound.

Provisions are weaker caused by large arrivals from the East; quote city-cured hams, 9@10c; do bacon, 6@7c; do shoulders, 5@6c; country-cured generally 4@5c; Eastern hams 10c; do breakfast bacon, 10c, nominally. Best Eastern lard in tins, 7 1/2@7 3/4c; do local,

7 1/2@7 3/4c, common local in large packages, 6c. Dried fruits quotable with more firmness and choice qualities find a good market at the following quotations: Sun-dried quartered apples 3@4c, sliced 4@5c, factory 5@5 1/2c; sun-dried quartered pears 6c, sliced 7c; factory 8c; pitted plums, 6@8c; Oregon prunes 6c, French 8c, graded 7@8c; common peaches 7 1/2c, peeled 11@12c; dried grapes 5 1/2@6c; choice raisins \$2.25 per box.

Mark Lane Review.

LONDON, May 10.—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the British grain trade, says:

Summer weather has prevailed. The absence of rain retards vegetation. The wheat trade is hardening. Sales of English wheat during the week were 65,930 quarters at 31s 3d, against 54,363 quarters at 38s 1d during the corresponding period of last year. Flour is firm but slow of sale. Foreign wheats are weaker, owing to large receipts of American flour. An expectation of a deluge of the English market with American flour, together with the fact that American gamblers in wheat are staggering under the load which they are attempting to carry, weakens the tone of the market, and paralyzes legitimate trade. American flour is cheaper. Five cargoes of wheat arrived. Three cargoes were sold, one was withdrawn and two remained. Trade forward is stagnant. To-day the market was slow and, and showed no improvement. Buyers were shy.

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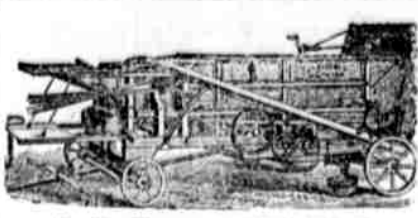

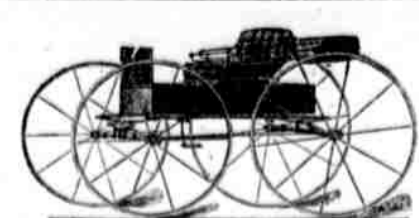

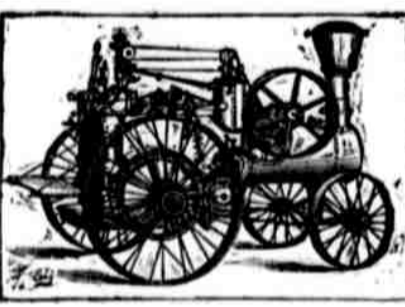
