COMMERCIAL.

PORTLAND, June 24, 1886.

During the past week the weather has been warm, and we have had several indications of rain, but up to the present time none has come, and there is no use denying that spring grain and gardens generally are in need of rains. The time, however, has passed for their doing much good, and we doubt if there will be any until the fall rains commence. We are informed that fall grain looks well and the yield promises to be large throughout the Willamette valley.

A correspondent of the Oregonian writing from East of the Mountains, especially Washington Territory, gives a few reasons why freights should be lowered by the O. R. & N. Co., and the whole idea advanced was that there would be less grain raised to the acre, and if we remember right it was fully fifty per cent. less than last year.

The wool has about all been gathered up by buyers, and those who are so lucky just now to have a choice lot can command the top prices—which in several cases up the valley has reached nearly 22c—or to be particular, 21c. We hear of sales at Salem on a basis of 21c, and better, and there now remains little unsold wool in Marion county at the present time. As we before stated, the average quality of wool generally is much above the average of former years. In fact Willamette valley wools quote along side those of the far-famed Umpqua. Wool growing in connection with mixed farming is the proper thing and it will be looked after more by our farmers in the future.

The wheat market is dull and buyers

and shippers are decidedly inactive. Several ships are reported to hand, but the outlook is not promising and takings are few.

Oats are quiet and the ruling quotation is 36 @ 38c per bushel with a possibility of being shaded.

Eggs are duller than last week—say 11 1/2c per dozen.

Wool is about as quoted in our local market, which appears at the head of the column—and which by-the-by, appears this week in a new form and we trust correctly.

Potatoes, for old, are 50 @ 65c per sack. Buttes as quoted in our last weeks report.

Poultry, chickens \$2.50 @ 3.00. Ducks \$5.00 @ 6.00 per dozen and turkeys as in standing market.

Hops, lides and provisions unchanged, but a slight advance in sugars is noted of about 1/2 of a cent for all grades.

Mark Lane Review

LONDON, June 21.—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the British grain trade, says:

The weather has been variable, and the wheat crops are fully three weeks late. Barleys and oats are backward. The trade has favored buyers. Sales of English wheat for the past week were 43,176 quarters, at 31s 4d, against 38,184 quarters at 31s 2d during the corresponding week last year. Flour was difficult to sell and weaker. Foreign wheat was unimproved, and buyers were scarce. Flour and barley were neglected. Oats were in large supply and 3d cheaper. Six cargoes of wheat arrived off coast, two were sold, five were withdrawn, and three remain, of which two were California. New crop California was offered at 33s 6d @ 34s. Today the market was slow. Most grades of wheat showed a decline of 6d on the fortnight. Other articles were somewhat steadier.

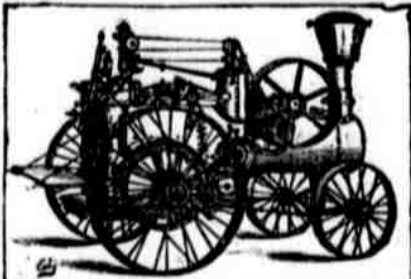

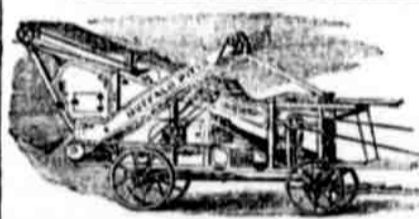

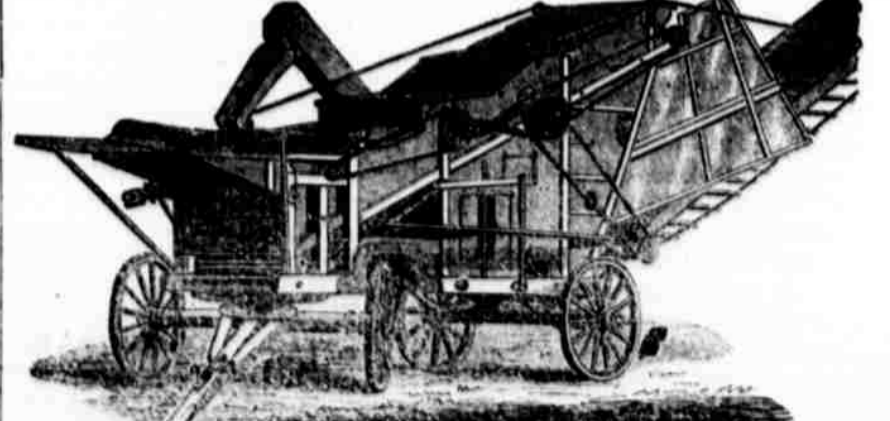
