COMMERCIAL.

THURSDAY Feb. 10, 1887. Winter continues, the thaw of Wednesday being followed by a sharp freeze on Wednesday night, that hardened the slush to ice.

February will hardly give us warm weather enough to start buds or prematurely injure fruit or growing crops. If we can have all our winter now, we shall be in good luck.

The foreign markets show a weak tendency in breadstuffs, but our home market knows no change. Valley wheat is sold as high as \$1.42 for choice milling lots; \$1.40 being average. Walla Walla offerings are held at \$1.35, with little doing. Buyers will not pay over \$1.30 unless compelled to fill out an order for a cargo.

Oats are held for home use as shippers will not pay over 46c@47c, while sellers ask 50c. The San Francisco market is heavy but quotations are the same.

Poultry—Chickens sell \$3.50@4.50, and the market is not overstocked. The high price may increase stocks and so come a decline.

Butter—California dairy has been in rather full supply and choice rolls have sold pretty low. There is to-day some improvement in price, quotations being 22 1/2@25c for fresh grass rolls; 18@20c for pickled roll or in brine. Local dairy is worth 20c@25c and poor lots are a drug.

Eggs—Market weak, at 30 cents. Hops are held firmly, but the market is stagnant and prices nominal. Sales made of English and German hops show a decline of 1/4 to 1/2 per pound.

Sales of English range 17c to 22c; German, 22@26c.

Wool is held firmly, and large London sales have been made at fair prices. Boston sales include 150,000 pounds Oregon 17@25c.

Fresh meats are held higher since the cold weather set in, and the cost of feeding has increased so much. Beef and mutton are held firm at 4@4 1/2c on foot, which is 8 to 9 dressed, butchers claim. Veal scarce, and commands 8@10c. Hogs are 3@3 1/2c on foot, and 5c dressed. Same prices prevail in country towns.

Potatoes have had to be handled carefully during the freezing weather, and prices are held well up.

Provisions have advanced half a cent on local packing; hams 11@11 1/2; bacon 9@9 1/2; shoulders, 9@7 1/2; eastern hams, 12 1/2; breakfast bacon, 11c; lard 8@8 1/2; Dried fruits are in good demand and stocks are well filled. Apples range from 6@7c for sun dried, and to 9 1/2@12 1/2c for bleached of best quality, and range all the way between, according to quality. Choice prunes 10c@12c. French, 8c; pitted plums 9c@10c.

Hides.—Dry hides 15@16c, light salted 6 1/2@7c, heavy do. 7@8c, dry kip and calf, 14@16c, salt kip 6@8c, salt calf 8@10c, veal 8c, valley deerskins 20@25c, Eastern Oregon 15@20c for winter and summer, sheepskins 75c@1.25 for short and long wool, elk hides 15c, beaver \$1.50 @ \$2.25, bearskins \$1.50@1.60.

Mark Lane Review.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—The Mark Lane Express, in its weekly review of the British grain trade says:

The condition of the English wheat offered has shown no improvement, and as a result there have been slow sales and lower values, both in London and the provinces. The sales of English wheat during the week were 44,300 qrs at 34s 4d, against 67,473 quarters at 29s 9d during the corresponding period last year. It is estimated that deliveries of English wheat from the beginning of the cereal year 1886-87 have been 18 per cent. under those for the same period in 1885-86. Country flour is 6d lower. Trade in foreign wheat is stagnant. Arrivals have been heavy, and stocks are increasing at Liverpool, Bristol and London. Australian shipments are commencing and the new crop of the Argentine Republic, Chili and India will be soon on the way here. Therefore, if peace, is maintained, there will be no change for higher values. Flour is dull at unchanged quotations. Corn hardened and prices have advanced 3d. Oats are firmer, and have recovered 4d. To-day English wheat was in bad condition, and very difficult of sale.

California Products

San Francisco, Jan. 27.—The Journal of Commerce to-day issued its annual trade review for last year. It presents a remarkably flattering showing for California. The wheat product for the year is shown to be 46,000,000 bushels; barley, 18,000,000 bushels; beet root sugar product, 2,000,000 pounds. Coinage at the San Francisco mint, \$25,000,000; value merchandise and treasure exported, \$67,000,000; wool clip, 40,000,000 pounds; wine product, 20,000,000 gallons; quicksilver, 30,000 flasks; total value of the products of the State in 1886, \$202,000,000; banking capital of State \$57,000,000; increase of immigration during the year, 21,686 persons.

Weather During January.

The rains for that month on this coast were confined to Oregon and Washington, with a few showery days in Northern California. On the 19th there were light showers in Southern California. The temperature has been warmer than usual on the whole coast. Washington was four degrees above, Oregon three degrees, Central California two degrees. North of California the rainfall has been over average. Through California it is below average. The Sacramento Valley has had only one-fourth an average fall of rain, diminishing as you go south, when it falls to only a thirteenth of an average. At San Diego only four hundredths of an inch of rain fell during the month.
