Moran, of Portland, has been convicted of manslaughter.

Having bought the Oregon and California road the Southern Pacific is now trying, so they say, to get the control of our narrow gauge railroads.

It is reported from San Francisco that the transfer of the Oregon railroad to the Southern Pacific has been completed.

The hard winter makes it probable that good beef will be scarce in California and elsewhere, and high in price.

A ship (iron) is said to have chartered to the united kingdom of Antwerp at 22s 6d from San Francisco.

An immensely rich gold quartz mine has been struck in a Nevada county mine and creates great excitement there.

A terrible fire occurred at Buffalo, burning the Richmond Hotel and thirty-five people in it.

The blockade at Bismarck lasts and the river is six miles wide. Many families have been rescued from their houses submerged. A terrific blizzard is storming and many are in great distress.

At the Buffalo Hotel fire six men were killed, twenty-one badly hurt and five persons are missing.

A revolutionary movement in Prussia extends to all parts of the empire and alarms all European natives. The recent arrests have caused the revolutionists to be more earnest than ever.

The sale of the Oregon and California road to the Southern Pacific is now officially announced and Mr. Crocker thinks the transfer will be made by July 1st. He expects to complete the road within the year 1887.

The Attorney General has decided a Walla Walla land entry in favor of the railroad, reversing Sparks.

On the night the President was fifty years old he went to the theatre.

A gorge broke at the Missouri river where the Northern Pacific crosses it, wrecking a railroad warehouse seven hundred feet long and doing much damage to towns below it. The Northern Pacific will not cross for several days as the river is six miles wide there.

The blockade of the Canadian Pacific continues in the Rocky Mountain and no through trains will be heard of for a fortnight.

The cholera is raging in several South American States, Chili, Peru, Uruguay, and the Argentine Republic.

Captain James B. Eades was buried last week at St. Louis.

Count de Lesseps says that Emperor William assured him he opposed war and would not so long as he lived favor any war that can be avoided, and Prince Bismarck says war is no longer imminent, but has been so.

Emperor William, of Germany, celebrated his 90th birthday in Berlin on March 21. He was tendered an ovation by 4,000 students. The Prince of Wales, the Chinese, turkey, and other nations sent presents.

Chris. Buckley, of San Francisco, has gone to Europe.

The Pope has sent a special delegate to extend congratulations to the Emperor of Germany on his 90th birthday.

Los Angeles, Cal., is having a small-pox scare. It is abating.

The President appointed the Interstate Commerce Commission as follows: W. R. Morrison, Illinois; A. Schoonmaker, N. Y.; W. T. Bragg, Alabama; Judge Cooley, Michigan; A. F. Walker, Vermont. The last two are Republicans.

Lawton, the New York merchant who absconded recently, left \$1,250,000 debts and got away with \$350,000 cash.

Floods continue throughout Dakota; and as a consequence few trains are getting by Bismarck, and Oregon mails suffer correspondingly.

An extensive forest fire is raging in Texas and has been for four days.

Advices received at St. Paul, Minn., state that the snow blockade on the Canadian Pacific line has been raised and trains are again running through to the Pacific coast.

**State and Territorial News.**

Baker county is in debt at least \$100,000.

The eighth annual stallion show will be given in McMinnville, Saturday, April 30, 1887.

Grant county has paid \$2162.25 since the 17th of last January on scalps of wild animals.

A number of improvements have already commenced in Jack-onville. The coming season presents a prosperous outlook for that place.

Baker City Democrat: Since 1870 the amount of Union county taxes that could not be collected aggregated \$22,649.43. Of this loss there has been paid to the State \$6436.10.

Weston Leader: A disease resembling epizootic is prevalent among the horses in Weston. None are yet reported as having died from the disease.

Bunchgrass Blade: Shearing will have to begin early this year on account of the condition of the wool. Sheep got poor during the storm, and thriving so fast now causes the wool to shed.

Several days ago Alex. Coudray killed three cougars at the mouth of Beaver creek, Klamath river, the largest measuring 9 feet from tip to tip. This makes ten that have been killed in that vicinity since last fall.

Toledo is on the Oregon Pacific railroad, about nine miles above Yaquina City. The country thereabout is settling up rapidly. Seven families, mostly Californians and all pretty well-to-do, have settled up the slough, and new places are being mapped out.

Thursday evening a light thunder storm visited Spokane Falls and vicinity.

Asotin county's delinquent tax this year foots up \$2,600 says the Sentinel.

Taking the school census as a basis, Spokane Falls has a population of 5000.

Colfax is assessed at \$345,000, being an increase of \$60,000 over last year.

The Review says not less than fifty buildings are under construction at Spokane Falls at the present time.

In the Palouse country the mud is drying rapidly and the farmers are beginning to plow. In a short time seeding will be the order of the day in that section.

The squaws are bringing hides into Pendleton that must have come from animals the winter killed.

Thousands of dry deer hides are being shipped from Rogue River. Killing deer for their skins is a regular business with some persons.

Seattle has many buildings in course of erection; so has the town of Asotin, far up Snake River.

Peach trees are in bloom at Walla Walla. On the Clearwater they are mostly killed, and on Snake river many buds are killed, but enough are left to make a crop, but no apricots or nectarines are left to bloom.

South of Snake river, as everywhere else east of the mountains, nature is putting on its spring aspect.

The Supreme Court has confirmed the right of Miss Isabella Teller to the farm in Polk county left her by her father and contested by her step-mother, reversing the decision of the Circuit Court.

Fully three thousand sheep pelts have come to the Dalles lately.

A car load of fine driving horses lately left Shedd for Chicago, shipped by A. Blaken.

The frost injured some grape vines in localities of Wasco county.

Tunnel City, on the Cascade line, has been rechristened Martin by the railroad people, and the station at the east end of the tunnel will be known by that name. The name was derived from Martin creek, which runs near by.

The Spokane Falls Chronicle learns from good authority that Major B. P. Moore has handed in his resignation as agent of the Chewelah Indian agency, to take effect on March 31. The successor is not known.
