The City Dads Meet.

Several Bills Cut Down.—Other Business Transacted.

Monday the regular meeting of the Board of Trustees was held at the council chamber, those answering at roll call were as follows: President, J. H. Beeman, Councilmen Richards, Williams and Parker.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

C. A. Baley presented his bill for service rendered as marshal amounting to \$14.30. On motion a reduction of \$1.05 was made and a warrant for \$13.25 ordered drawn in favor of Mr. Baley for his services.

The bill of W. A. Carter for services rendered, amounting to \$16.25 was taken up. President Beeman objected to allowing the full amount of the bill on the ground that there were 11 warrants included in the bill which were issued by one of the members of the board, who was acting as Recorder pro-tem. On motion the bill was allowed except pay for the 11 warrants which amounted to \$1.10, and a warrant for \$15.15 was ordered drawn.

The bill of J. W. Hayes for blacksmithing was cut down to \$1.50 and a warrant ordered drawn for that amount.

The following bills were accepted and warrants ordered drawn for the various amounts: J. H. Beeman, for services rendered \$3.70. Colvig & Reams, for att'y's fees and filing papers, \$25.00. C. Williams, dog tax refunded \$1.00. H. A. Cryder, use of telephone 25 cents. W. Hubbard, wood and dog tax refunded \$3.50. After a few interesting remarks by members of the Board regarding the proposed organization of a fire department the council adjourned.
