The Examiners' Bill.

At the February examination of teachers there were 39 applicants for certificates. The board of examiners is composed of the county superintendent and two assistants, appointed by him. The following is a copy of the bills which each of them presented to the county court for their services, and which were laid over for examination until the April term of the county court: Jacksonville, Or., Feb. 17, 1897.

JACKSON COUNTY

To Gus Newbury, C. F. Shepherd and N. H. Clayton, Dr.

To seven days' service as examiners February examination of teachers, each \$21 00

The following letter was received by Judge Crowell from the school superintendent of Marion county:

Salem, Oregon, March 23, 1897.

Wm. S. CROWELL, Jacksonville, Or.

Dear Sir:—We had 54 applicants at the Feb. examination, and the board of examiners was dismissed on Saturday evening of the same week the examination began, hence they each received \$12.

From the foregoing letter it appears that it took the Marion county board of examiners four days to complete the examination of 54 teachers and their papers, for which they charged the legal fee of \$3 per day, making \$12 each, or \$36 for the three members. At the same time the Jackson county board presented a charge for seven days' services at \$3 per day, making \$21 each, or \$63 for the three members—for examining 39 teachers.

The matter stands thus: It takes the Marion county board four days to examine 54 teachers at a total expense of \$36. It takes the Jackson county board seven days to examine 39 teachers at a total expense of \$63.

We understand that the examiners are very indignant at the county court for laying their bills over for investigation, and threaten to bring suit against Jackson county if the county court should reduce the same.—Jacksonville Times.
