PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

A Pomona nurseryman has orders
\$300,000 young olive trees.

Los Angeles is seeking the establish-
ment of a \$50,000 glass factory.

East-bound tourist travel on the
Santa Fe is exceptionally heavy.

The San Pedro Oil company has a
well down 700 feet at San Pedro with
favorable indications for oil.

Azusa, Cal., citizens are talking of
forming a vigilance society to deal out
justice to horse-thieves in that vicinity.

In digging a well on the Warm
Springs, Or., reservation, recently,
George Krause found human bones and
teeth at a depth of forty feet.

Worms continue devastating orch-
ards about San Bernardino. A black-
jointed beetle has been found that kills
the worms. The beetle supply, how-
ever, is very limited.

St. Lovren, the convicted Visalia
train-robber has been removed to the
Kings county jail for safe keeping,
pending a decision on his appeal to the
supreme court.

The Southern Pacific coal mines at
Red Canyon, Utah, produce 500 tons a
day, all of which is consumed by the
company.

One of the latest mineral discoveries
of note in Southern California is re-
ported from Elsinore, near which place
a large body of low-grade gold-bearing
ore has been found.

The latest Astoria, Or., directory
shows the Johnsons overshadow the
Joneses by 16 to 1, and the Olsens out-
number the Smiths by 8 to 1.

Hood river, Or., strawberries will be
in the market within the next week,
and from present indications the crop
will be a phenomenal one. In the
height of the season two and three car-
loads will be shipped daily.

Two wagon loads of Indians from the
Siletz reservation passed through Eu-
gene, Or., recently for the Rogue river,
country to engage in salmon fishing.
They will remain away from the reser-
vation all summer, and in the fall will
secure work in the hop fields.

Marshal Stiles and Policeman Croner
routed a hobo camp in the northeast-
ern outskirts of Eugene, Or., last week.
There were nineteen men in the gang
and each had his certain duties to per-
form in camp, which consisted of a
cookhouse, barber shop, laundry, etc.

William Sikes, a Sonoma county
rancher seriously slashed Lewis Foutz
with a razor, during a quarrel Monday.

The schooner Nettie Sundborg is
ashore at Hardy Creek, Cal., and may
be a total loss.

Christopher Strothman, an aged and
wealthy farmer of Sacramento, com-
mitted suicide by hanging himself in a
barn.

Major John A. Darling of the Third
artillery stationed at the Presidio, San
Francisco, has been chosen military
attache to the legation at Vienna.

L. Givan, living at the mouth of the
Little Butte creek, in Jackson county,
Or., says that the coyote caught by J.
Montgomery two years ago and which
was let loose and marked by cutting
off his tail and ears and a bell tied
on his neck, is still in the woods and
has quite a following of coyotes, being
a terror to poultry-raisers in that sec-
tion.

A frightful accident occurred on the
electric railway running from Mount
Tabor to Portland, Or., last week.
While a car was crossing a trestle it
jumped the track and fell into a ravine
twenty feet below. W. S. Blanchard,
Newton Hansen and Miss Katherine
Baillie were killed and nearly a score
badly injured. Michael Benninger died
from the effects of injuries the day fol-
lowing the accident.

It is reported that an English syndi-
cate is about to purchase 75,000 acres
of land in Merced county.

A Randsburg man advertises for sale
a town lot, cooking utensils and bed-
ding, "together with a lady that goes
with the outfit," all for \$18.

The Winters ranch in Lassen county
was lately sold for \$72,000.

The steamship Empress of China
arrived at Victoria from China last
week with two cases of smallpox on
board.

The steamer Victoria left Tacoma
last Friday for Japan carrying 200,000
feet of fir lumber, to be used by the
Japs in making tea chests. This was
the first lumber shipped there for that
purpose.

Reports received from all fruit-grow-
ing sections of California are to the
effect that fruit prospects were never
better. The indications are for both
a large yield and a fine quality.

August Keiffer living near Redwood
city, Cal., was thrown from the seat of
his wagon and run over and killed.

Thomas Thompson, the man who
picked a watch from Senator Mahoney
at San Francisco last November, has
been sentenced to serve six years in
San Quentin.

The flour mill at Collis, Cal., and the
ware house run in connection with it
were destroyed by fire a few days ago;
loss \$12,000.

The experiment of raising oysters in
Humboldt bay has proven very success-
ful.

The Chino creamery handles a daily
average of 2200 pounds of milk.

Apple buyers are contracting for
crops at good prices in Monterey
county.

No vine hoppers have been found in
the vicinity of Tulare.

The only onyx factory this side of
Buffalo has been established at Phoen-
ix, A. T.

The new sugar factory at Salinas will
employ 30,000 acres of land planted to
beets.

Subscriptions amounting to \$29,000
have been made to the stock of the
Salinas electric railroad.

More than 11,000 pounds of garden
seeds were shipped from San Jose to
eastern points during the past week.

The orange crop of Highland, Cal., is
practically all forwarded to the market.
The total for the season is 235 cars, an
increase of twenty cars over last year's
crop.

The May queen contest at Redding
been a spirited one, and \$230 was re-
alized from it. Miss Amelia Cline-
schmidt was the victor.

After being out fifteen minutes the
jury in the case of the people against
ex-Recorder and Auditor Gilbert P.
Hall of Sonoma county returned a ver-
dict of not guilty. Hall was indicted
for the embezzlement of \$38.

Santa Ana sent out the largest ship-
ment of sheep that has left Southern
California for the east in years last
week. There were 2400 head sent to
Chicago, making a full train of twelve
double-decked stock cars.

The building, plant and stock of the
Standard Oil company at Tacoma,
Wash., were damaged to the extent of
\$15,000 by an incendiary blaze.

C. C. Ingels of San Jose has been
awarded \$20,280 against the Southern
Pacific company for injuries received
in a collision of the broad and narrow
gauge trains at Santa Clara more than
a year ago.

Constable Frank Slanker of Ponomo
captured Jaun Lugo, alias Frank Ren-
ada, a triple murderer, who has been
wanted by the officers of several coun-
ties for years.

A ten-pound box of cherries ship-
ped from Vacaville, Cal., sold for
\$6 at Chicago.

The Tacoma, Wash., Chamber of
Commerce is working for the appoint-
ment of a tea-inspector for its city.

The young son of J. F. Sersanons of
Willows met with a painful accident
while swinging. He fell in such a man-
ner as to bend the bones of his arms
instead of breaking them.

While carrying a horse Monday after-
noon at Oroville Ira Worthing was
kicked in the face by the vicious ani-
mal, breaking his nose and badly cut-
ting his face.

Sheriff Houston of Shasta county has
received a hangman's rope from un-
known parties to convey to him the
information that he might expect a
lynching party to relieve him of five
murderers now confined in the jail at
Redding. No importance is attached
to the matter, though the same inci-
dent occurred just before the lynching
of the Ruggles boys.

The British premier does not favor
a reinquiry into the Behring sea fishing
dispute, considering it too costly.

For the murder of an old man in his
dotage, a child and a young woman,
the assault of two young girls and the
burning of the homes of their victims,
six young negroes were hanged by a
mob of infuriated negroes at Sunnyside,
Walter county Texas.

David H. Hays, for eighteen years
cashier of the St. Louis post office, has
been arrested charged with the embe-
zlement of \$15,000.

Mrs. T. J. Watkins, formerly Miss
Emiline McMullen of Sacramento, sur-
prised her husband and his colored
paramour on Pennsylvania avenue, in
Washington, and horsewhipped him
until he yelled for mercy.

Joe Lane, his wife and child were
found dead at Bonny Eago, Me. All
had been shot. It is supposed to
have been a double murder and suicide.

There is a growing belief in political
circles in Washington that the gov-
ernor of Oregon will soon call an extra
session of the legislature to select a
successor to Mitchell. There is a gen-
eral belief that Corbett will not be
seated as matters now stand, and pres-
sure will be brought to bear by the
republican leaders upon the Oregon
delegation to secure action by the state
executive at once.

of his gang, in a fight at Doe river,
Mitchell county, N. C.

Dr. J. C. McCall and Frank Boley, a
carpenter, both of Stockton, were found
dead in the same stateroom of a steam-
er that had arrived at San Francisco
from Stockton. They ended a spree by
committing suicide.
