PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

The gunboat Concord, which has been thoroughly overhauled at Mare island, is ready for active service and will go into commission immediately.

T. Flaherty, a tramp, is in jail at San Luis Obispo, charged with criminal assault upon the little daughter of Rev. Jody of San Miguel. Flaherty barely escaped lynching.

Lew Roberts, a traveling comedian, died in Petaluma from the effects of drinking cold water when overheated.

Three members of Company F, N. G. C., are under arrest at Fresno for failing to attend the annual inspection of the company.

The experiment of sprinkling roads at night is to be tried in Santa Clara county.

William H. Green, formerly a pupil in the Whittier Reform school, and Mrs. Ellen J. Wilson, who was his teacher in the institution, were married at Los Angeles.

The department of botany of the University of California requests people throughout the state to gather and mail to it the seeds of California wild flowers.

The Oakland Bank of Savings commenced suit against Alameda county for \$1842.03, which, it is alleged, was improperly collected in taxes last year.

James La Rue and William Vaughan of Oakland were drowned in San Francisco bay while yachting.

William Carr, a motorman in the employ of the Haywards Electric Railway company, came out of a serious railway accident with marks that tell of the eccentricity of the artificial lightning. He received the current through his left arm, yet that member is scarcely marked, while along his left leg from his thigh bone to his calf is a long burn. The leg did not come in contact with the wire, but the current went through his body and is supposed to have been attracted to the surface by some silver coins in his pocket. Carr's left leg is temporarily paralyzed, but he will soon recover.

Ex-Judge A. L. Frick of Oakland has commenced suit against George W. McNear and P. E. Bowles for services rendered at Sacramento in securing the passage of the wharf, chute and pier bill. He claims \$5000.

A wholesale attempt to injure the reputation of California brandy by sending abroad a large amount of Nebraska corn spirits of low grade as pure grape brandy has been detected by Collector of Port Wise. The managers of the San Francisco Bonded Manufacturing Warehouse are the persons accused.

One of the big guns to be mounted at the entrance to San Francisco harbor was wrecked at Selby station, near Vallejo junction. The railroad people say the gun was not injured by the accident.

Santa Rosa has had an epidemic of fires lately.

William King and Mike Ford, Solano county farmers had a quarrel in which Ford struck King with a shovel, splitting open his head. Ford started to go to Vallejo to give himself up, but fell dead. The excitement caused heart trouble.

The sealing schooner General Siglin was seen floating about in the waters of the North Pacific ocean a wreck. The dead body of Harry Saunders, the mate, was seen lashed to the wheel. No trace of the remainder of the crew and passengers has been found.

J. G. Bently, the janitor of the courthouse at Merced, Cal., is under arrest charged with raising a squirrel bounty claim of \$2.30 to \$22.30.

Two mammoth sturgeons, the total weight of which was 1754 pounds, were

caught on one line by Columbia river fisherman. They are the largest ever taken from those waters.

The immense tannery of A. B. Patrick & Co., situated in South San Francisco, has been destroyed by fire, causing a loss of \$225,000.

E. W. Davis of Santa Rosa, has been appointed secretary of the board of regents of the California state university.

The shipping and commission house of Williams, Brown & Co. of San Francisco has failed. They owe nearly half a million dollars.

William J. Bryan will visit the Pacific coast during the month of July. He will speak in several large cities.

An explosion of gas in a grocery store at San Francisco wrecked the building, wounded a number of people and did damage to the extent of \$4000.

A bloody affair took place in a Chinese washhouse at Riverside, Cal., in which Ah Ching was ruthlessly murdered by Quang Sing Yee. The cause of the trouble was a \$50 debt owing to the murderer.

Two accidents occurred in a Scotia, Cal., sawmill on a recent day, one of which resulted fatally. Martin A. Anderson was caught between two logs and crushed so that he died in a short time. Clarence Kelley sustained a crushed ankle by a log rolling on his leg.

Custom officers at Tacoma, Wash., were directed from Washington to deport the remaining sixty-four of the 114 Chinese brought over by the steamer Victoria en route to the Nashville exposition. The balance were admitted.

Chico, Cal., is over run with hard characters and petty thieves.

The Tacoma Mining Exchange was organized by Tacoma, Wash., mining men.

Waco, Tex., and immediate section was visited by a severe wind, rain and hail storm, which caused much damage. Sam Knox, a twelve-year-old boy, was killed and several persons were injured.

The board of supervisors of Shasta county has revoked authority to collect tolls on the Reid, Baker and Winter toll roads.

Charles Feister, the convicted murderer of Grant's Pass, Or., who has successfully cheated the gallows for a year and a half on the insanity dodge, has been caught napping and confessed the fraud. Feister is a wife murderer.

Ed M. Logan was killed in a sawmill at Igerna, Cal., by being struck by an iron pulley which broke from its fastenings.

Harbormaster Edward M. Ruthledge died at his home in Eureka, Cal., after a short illness with cramps.

The remains of Weslie Williamson a bachelor, were found in the smoldering ashes of his cabin which was burned at Goldendale, Wash. Foul play is suspected.

Anton Pfauer, a banker of Forest Grove, Or., received a letter containing \$5 conscience money and two tracts from a converted thief now in Sacramento, Cal. About six years ago Pfauer was robbed in Portland of \$15 and \$4000 securities.

Chairman Henderson of the San Joaquin county supervisors, and Supervisor Hemphill, who attended the supervisors convention at Los Angeles, are to be sued for their expenses, which they drew from the county treasurer upon their return home.

Vincent Sutton, formerly postmaster at Oretown, Or., who was convicted last fall of misappropriation of government funds and sentenced to six months imprisonment in the county jail, completed his sentence, but was immediately arrested again charged by the United States grand jury with the embezzlement of \$414. Sutton is the man who swam through floods and icy cold waters in order to give up to the officers.

A fishing boat with four men has been missing from San Francisco for several days, and is supposed to have been lost together with its occupants.

The skeleton of a man was found in a creek near Tacoma, Wash. It is supposed to be the remains of Con Demolitor, a young Canadian who went hunting six years ago and never returned.

A terrible railroad accident befell a military train between Rockenhoff and Eilva, Russia, in which two officers, and 100 soldiers were killed, and sixty others seriously injured.

All four of the daily newspapers of Sydney, N. S. W., have been fined \$500 each for contempt of court, consisting of improper comment upon the trial of Frank Butler, the Australian murderer, which is now pending.

Dave Cotton, Henry Williams and Sabe Stewart, three negroes, were lynched by a mob at Rosebud, Tex., for attempting to criminally assault a white girl.

Lilly Langtry, the famous English beauty and actress, was granted a divorce by Judge Crump, at Lakeport, Cal.

J. F. Lee is in jail at San Jose for sending obscene letters through the mails.

Teredora honeycombed the piles supporting the Lillis sawmill at Tacoma, Wash., and the structure collapsed. The mill had been built but a few months.

A number of horses sent to Cook's Inlet, Alaska, died owing to the extreme cold.

Christina B. Isham of Pasadena, Cal., has fallen heir to the income of \$10,000, left her by a brother, Edward Beach, who was killed at Chicago a short time ago.

The quantity of California prunes going into cold storage at New York this year is the smallest on record. The demand for the fruit is in excess of the supply.
